Rector's Report

On Easter Day, we celebrated the resurrection of Christ in Orsett Church. It was wonderful to be able to worship together in person again. May is another busy month in the church calendar.

On Rogation Sunday, the Church has traditionally offered prayer for God's blessings on the fruits of the earth and the labours of those who produce our food. A common feature of Rogation days was the ceremony of beating the bounds, in which a procession of parishioners, led by the minister and churchwardens would proceed around the boundary of their parish and pray for its protection in the forthcoming year. As it is no longer practical to follow exact boundaries, services have a focus on specific elements of creation such as livestock, fields, orchards and gardens. This year we will celebrate Rogation Sunday on 9th May at Orsett Church.

On Ascension Day, 40 days after Easter, we remember Jesus leaving this earth and returning to his Father, ascending into heaven to take his throne over all dominions and powers. Ascension Day will be celebrated in our Tuesday Morning Holy Communion Service on 11th May at 9.30am at Horndon Church.

In between Ascension Day and Pentecost, 'Thy Kingdom Come' takes place. It is a global prayer movement that invites Christians around the world to pray from Ascension to Pentecost for more people to come to know Jesus. Since its start in May 2016, God has grown Thy Kingdom Come from a dream of possibility into a movement. Christians from 172 countries have taken part in praying 'Come Holy Spirit', so that friends and family, neighbours and colleagues might come to faith in Jesus Christ. During the 11 days of Thy Kingdom Come we are encouraged to:

- Deepen our own relationship with Jesus Christ.
- Pray for 5 friends or family to come to faith in Jesus.
- Pray for the empowerment of the Spirit that we would be effective in our witness.

And then, at Pentecost, we celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit. Pentecost is celebrated on the Sunday 50 days after Easter. The name comes from the Greek word, 'pentekoste,' which means fiftieth. Pentecost is also regarded as the birthday of the Christian Church, and the start of the church's mission to the world. This year Pentecost falls on Sunday 23rd May and we will be celebrating it at Bulphan Church.

Christian Aid Week also takes place in May and will focus on the issue of Climate Change.

'This climate crisis hurts us all. But people living in poverty fight the worst of it every day. From drought to flooding, climate change robs people of control over their lives.' Christian Aid

If you would like to contribute to the work of Christian Aid, you can do this by giving through our online envelope, details of which can be found later in the magazine. Last year we raised over £600 through our e-envelope. It would be great if we could equal or even beat that total this year. Our service will be at Horndon Church on Sunday 16th May.

We will also be running an online SHAPE course during May and June to help people discover their God given gifts and how they might use them in God' service. Do contact me if you are interested in participating in this course.

I would certainly challenge anyone who says that being Christian is boring!



How welcome it was to receive communion after such a long period in the Covid wilderness, but how strange it felt not to be able to shake hands with friends and to try to converse through a mask.

On Sunday 25th April we had two services back-to-back; Holy Communion at 8.45 followed by a Family Service at 10.00, both were well supported and only just within our congregation limit for social distancing. I understand why some people were unhappy about having the church door open on a cold Sunday morning, but it must be recognised that to make the church Covid safe there must be full ventilation and the only way to achieve this is with a fully opened door.

Sunday was our first service within the new rota, which is quite a departure from the previous pattern, and will need time to bed into one's established routine. However there is a very clear diagram in this magazine, which together with the weekly notice sheets should avoid any misunderstanding. The online diagram also has an end of month overlap which will help with forward diary dates.

Each Monday and Thursday between 100.00 and midday we open our church door for private prayer and contemplation and from the 17th May we hope to be able to offer refreshments too; Janet McCheyne has kindly volunteered to arrange this. But we must be mindful that Government Policy might change and plans may have to be put on hold. Nonetheless, all of the safety requirements such as wearing face masks and social distancing will need to be observed.

As with all churches, the pandemic has severely reduced our income and for Bulphan the Parish Room was an asset that brought in revenue from lettings. This has obviously dried-up since closure in March 2020 and the limit that can presently be accommodated under government guidelines for socially distanced church business meetings is 6. Once further opening up is permitted we will hopefully see an active return of our usual social groups. Whilst income will always be a necessary fact of life, the restart of safe social gatherings and one-to-one interaction is most important for us all.

May we all look forward to a summer that brings warm sunny days and something close to normality.

Edward Bear loved being in church again and he also loved the cross that was made of beautiful flowers – did you see it outside the church gate during that week?








"I hope my friends have been able to meet up with more of their family and friends", thought Edward Bear, "I know that I've really missed seeing my friends face-to-face".




By 2030, the Wall aims to restore 100 million hectares of currently degraded land, sequester 250 million tonnes of carbon and create 10 million jobs in rural areas.

FAMOUS PERSON IN MAY

BORN 5TH MAY 1921 – DIED 12TH NOVEMBER 2013



Mavis Lilian Batey, MBE (née Lever)

was an English code-breaker during World War II. Her work at Bletchley Park was one of the keys to the success of D-Day. She later became a garden historian, who campaigned to save historic parks and gardens, and an author.

Early Life

Mavis Lilian Lever was born in Dulwich to her seamstress mother and postal worker father. She was brought up in Norbury and went to Coloma Convent Girls' School in Croydon. She was studying German at University College, London at the outbreak of World War II, concentrating on the German romantics in particular.

Bletchley Park Codebreakers

Initially employed by London Section to check the personal columns of *The Times* for coded spy messages, in 1940 she was recruited to work as a codebreaker at Bletchley Park. She worked as an assistant to Dilly Knox, and was closely involved in the decryption effort before the Battle of Matapan. According to *The Daily Telegraph*, she became so familiar with the styles of individual enemy operators that she could determine that two of them had a girlfriend called Rosa and this insight allowed her to develop a successful technique.

In December 1941 she broke a message between Belgrade and Berlin that enabled Knox's team to work out the wiring of the Abwehr Enigma, an Enigma machine previously thought to be unbreakable. While at Bletchley Park she met Keith Batey, a mathematician and fellow codebreaker whom she married in 1942.

Later Life

Batey spent some time after 1945 in the Diplomatic Service, and then brought up three children. She published a number of books on garden history, as well as some relating to Bletchley Park, and served as President of the Garden History Society, of which she became Secretary in 1971.

She was awarded the Veitch Memorial Medal in 1985, and made a Member of the Order of the British Empire (MBE) in 1987, in both cases for her work on the preservation and conservation of gardens.

Aged 92 and a widow since 2010, she died on 12 November 2013.
