Rector's Reflections

We have just returned from a family break in the Lake District, when we camped in the grounds of Rydal Hall near Ambleside, close to Rydal Water and Grasmere.

Whilst we were away, we enjoyed some walking, cycling, wild swimming and canoeing but I also had a chance to read some books and 'top up' spiritually. Our campsite was in the grounds of the Diocesan Retreat Centre and their library was available to use.

I read books by CS Lewis, as well as the challenging but inspiring life stories of three different missionaries including Gladys Aylward and Hudson Taylor, both of whom served in China, and one of a doctor serving in Liberia in the middle of the Ebola Crisis and it was interesting to note some of the similarities between the impact of the Ebola epidemic and the Covid pandemic. Sadly, this particular doctor is now suffering the effects of long Covid which she contracted whilst working in the UK.

All of the stories I read challenged me and caused me to reflect upon how much I am and would be prepared to give up in order to serve Christ and they prompted me to think about the stumbling blocks that regularly hinder me!

But I also mulled over the fact that we have all given up much over the past 18 months and in doing so we have learned to appreciate and value other things that we once took for granted and to, perhaps, meet God in different and unexpected ways.

I do encourage you to read some Christian books over the summer as they can be a great way of helping all of us grow in our faith, through increasing our knowledge and understanding of God by providing us with inspiration as well as challenge. If you need any recommendations of good books to read, then please do let me know.

Having given up much over the past two years, many Covid restrictions have now been lifted, and for some people this feels like freedom but for others it raises anxiety levels particularly as we have seen an increase in Covid cases, including quite a number locally.

As a church we are now called upon to forge the best way forward and I will be working with the PCCs to discern the best way to approach this. I know that some people are, understandably, keen to sing again in church and do everything we did before whereas others are still fearful of coming into our church buildings. Please can I ask for your prayers and sensitivity as we seek to move forward together in a collaborative, loving and mutually supportive way.

And please do remember and keep in your prayers those who continue to be isolated, for whom the past 18 months have really taken their toll.

As ever, please be assured of my love and prayers for you all.

Great news! On the 16th July Bulphan qualified for a silver ECO award. Thanks to Lynda Robertson and her endeavours we have met the set criteria required for this distinction. We believe that we are the first in Thurrock Deanery to achieve this. Whether Gold is a step too far

remains to be seen, but as energy conservation forms a large part of the submission it is difficult to see what can be realised in a draughty medieval church. Watch this space.

On Tuesday 20th July, the 'Archdeacon's Visitation' service was held in Grays Church. This is the service where Churchwardens are 'admitted' for the forthcoming year. Last year's service didn't happen because we were in lockdown and wardens agreed to do an unelected further year. But the six wardens from this benefice were each 'admitted' to office: Sonia and Alastair from Horndon, Janet and Jackie from Orsett and Frank and I from Bulphan. Additionally, Frank also holds the office of Chair of the Laity on Thurrock Deanery Synod.

This month we were very grateful when Julian Macalle and his team augmented Bulphan in Bloom's churchyard grass cutting. To do this Julian brought employees and machinery during the working day to complete the task. An extremely generous act which is much appreciated.

It has been some time since I was able to take our book of remembrance to the Calligrapher in Surrey, but as things become a little easier I will endeavour to go there and get the book updated. HORNDON ON THE HILL CHURCHWARDEN'S REPORT

It's August, high summer where the days are long and the grass is high. Many thanks to our Gardening Team for keeping on mowing, trimming, weeding. There's always room for more members to help out. They meet every Tuesday morning at the church.

Continuing with the growing theme, on 27th June it was Farm Sunday. Curtis Farm in Fobbing farmed by George Young and his parents was open to the public. The farm grows 1200 acres of crops without using any insecticides. George has created a network for wildlife across the farm splitting his fields with 6m strips in between for animal and insect life. His farm now boasts rare dragonflies and quail which haven't been seen for decades in the South East. He has also planted a variety of different trees (nearing 7,000) which he hopes will be able to cool the land, having witnessed this method first hand whilst visiting a farm in Australia. His move to organic has also meant he uses cattle to graze fields and purchased a herd or Red Poll heifers in November which he will soon start milking. He also plants wheat that hasn't been grown since the early 1930s. He sells his harvest to small organic supply chains but has also recently built a small flour mill on site where he intends to start milling his own wheat and, in a few years, will add a bakery too. This year he has grown flax for linen. There are two public footpaths that go through the farm, should you fancy a great afternoon out, being numbers 14 and 199.

We now have full certification to prove our Bronze status of Eco church. Since March this year a further 500 churches have joined this initiative bringing the total to 3,800 churches that are registered. Again, back in June (5-13) there was a 'Churches Count on Nature' week where participating churches recorded different wildflowers and grasses growing in their churchyards. Collated data was added to the National Biodiversity Network, results to follow. Although we did not get involved this year, we have already put aside an area in the churchyard where the grass and plants are left unmown.

Finally, as lockdown restrictions ease, we look forward to seeing more people face to face over a tea, coffee or cake or at a service waving over a pew. The Woolmarket Music Society will be recommencing its wonderful monthly events some of which are held in the church. Matthew McCombie will be playing piano in church on Saturday July 24th at 7.30pm. FAMOUS PERSON IN AUGUST

WILLIAM IV, also called Prince William Henry, duke of Clarence, (German) Wilhelm Heinrich, byname the Sailor King.

Born on August 21st, 1765 in London, died on June 20th, 1837, Windsor Castle, king of Great Britain and Ireland and king of Hanover from June 26, 1830. He was personally opposed to parliamentary reform, but grudgingly accepted the epochal Reform Act of 1832, which, by transferring representation from depopulated



"rotten boroughs" to industrialized districts, reduced the power of the British crown and the landowning aristocracy over the government. William understood the theory of the more limited monarchy, once saying 'I have my view of things, and I tell them to my ministers. If they do not adopt them, I cannot help it. I have done my duty.'

The third son of King George III, he entered the Royal Navy at the age of 13, fought in the American Revolution, and, while serving in the West Indies, formed a close friendship with the future naval hero Horatio (afterward Viscount) Nelson. When he left the sea in 1790, however, he had become unpopular with many other fellow officers and had angered his father by his numerous love affairs. Between 1794 and 1807 he had 10 illegitimate children (surnamed Fitzclarence) by the Irish comedienne Dorothea Jordan. His marriage (July 11, 1818) to Princess Adelaide of Saxe-Meiningen produced two daughters, both of whom died in infancy. On William's death, therefore, the British crown passed to his niece Princess Victoria, and the Hanoverian crown passed to his brother Ernest Augustus, duke of Cumberland.

The duke became heir presumptive on the death (November 6, 1817) of Princess Charlotte Augusta, the only legitimate child of his elder brother, the Prince Regent (afterward King George IV, reigned 1820–30). In April 1827 the new prime minister, George Canning, revived for him the office of lord high admiral, but he was forced to resign in August 1828, when the duke of Wellington was premier. After succeeding George IV as king, William proved to be less brilliant but also less selfish and more attentive to official business than his brother had been.

In May 1832 the prime minister, Charles Grey, the 2nd Earl Grey, asked the king to create at least 50 new peers to overcome the House of Lords majority hostile to parliamentary reform. At first William refused, but, after Wellington had failed to form a Tory (Conservative) ministry, Grey's Whigs resumed office with the king's written promise to create enough peers to carry the Reform Bill. The Lords, sufficiently threatened, allowed the bill to pass. As a consequence of redistricting, Sir Robert Peel's Tories were unable to gain a Commons majority in the election of January 1835, and from April of that year the king had to deal with an uncongenial Whig premier, William Lamb, 2nd Viscount Melbourne, whom he had previously dismissed.

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
