Rector's Reflections

After Easter, we spent a week in Snowdonia doing some walking. Whilst we were there, we saw many new-born lambs and spring flowers in bloom. It was lovely to see new life and the hope that it brings at a time when there is so much despair in the world. But, as I reflected, I was reminded that hope is not just something that we feel inside, it is something that we are called to work for on behalf of others.

As Christians, we are commissioned to care for our brothers and sisters both locally and globally and it can be hard to know how to do this. Recently the Archbishop of Canterbury challenged and raised ethical concerns about the Home Secretary's decision to send asylum seekers to Rwanda. Our Diocesan Bishop, herself an asylum seeker, has also supported the Archbishop's comments and sent the following letter to the Home Secretary:

Dear Home Secretary

In this Easter season I am writing to you, both as Home Secretary and as one of the MPs in the Diocese of Chelmsford which I serve, regarding your latest proposals to process asylum cases in Rwanda. You will be aware of the very serious reservations expressed by the Archbishop of Canterbury in his Easter sermon. I stand full square behind his comments, and my own lived experience as an asylum seeker makes me extremely anxious about this scheme and its implications.

This policy treats the most vulnerable in our midst in a cruel and inhumane way and it is for this reason that I am compelled to appeal to you, even at this late stage, to listen to the voices that are being raised from a cross section of public opinion. Those who find their way to this country, often through treacherous means, deserve to have their cases considered and processed here. To do otherwise is, as the Archbishop says, "sub-contracting out our responsibilities ... the opposite of the nature of God, who himself took responsibility for our failures".

In your Times article of the 18th April you suggest that "those institutions that criticise the plans fail to offer their own solutions". This is to misunderstand the important role of the Church of England, particularly through the national leadership of the Archbishop of Canterbury and the parliamentary responsibilities of the Lords Spiritual. We are not tasked with providing worked out political solutions – that is the job of Government and politicians. But it is our responsibility to point out where there are serious ethical and moral implications arising from Government proposals. I would also want to say that it is disingenuous of your Cabinet colleague, Mr Rees-Mogg, to suggest that the Archbishop "misunderstands what the policy is trying to achieve". Thoughtful criticism should not be dismissed in this off hand manner.

Finally, I want to thank you for your recent tweet with its traditional Easter Greeting. The Christian message of new life in all its fullness which we celebrate at Easter cannot be separated from the reality of lived experience and is exemplified in the way we treat the most vulnerable in our society.

In the words of Jesus himself, "whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you did for me."

I, personally, support the views of both Archbishop Justin and Bishop Guli. Whilst not advocating promoting party politics from the pulpit I do believe that, as Christians, we are called to speak up for injustices as we believe Christ would have done. And, sometimes, this includes challenging political decisions which we believe, after prayerful consideration, to be inappropriate.

Bishop Guli recently came to speak at our Deanery Synod meeting and told something of her own story. This story is recorded in her book, 'Cries for a Lost Homeland: Reflections on Jesus' sayings from the Cross' which you may be interested to read.

HORNDON ON THE HILL CHURCHWARDEN'S REPORT

As I'm writing this the sun is shining, lawn mowers are buzzing and there is barely a cloud in the sky. Our Tuesday Gardening team have been busy making both the church and graveyards look glorious. If the weather continues in a similar vein Open church on a Tuesday and Saturday morning will be held outdoors. Many hands do make light work so, if you have an hour or so to spare please consider joining either the gardeners or helping out at Open church. There's the added bonus of free teas, coffees and sometimes homemade cakes; plus, chats and catchups with friends, it's definitely growing in popularity.

The 'Living in Love and Faith' course took place throughout most of March. This was held at St Cedd's church Stifford Clays for five Mondays from 7.30 – 9pm and was open to all from Thurrock Deanery. We commend this course to you. Our hope and prayer is that as we engage with it together across the church, we will learn to live more fully in the way of Christ – in love and faith.'

Bulphan Churchwarden's Report

At the time of writing, with a worsening situation in the Ukraine, it is difficult to be upbeat and optimistic about anything. But seeing again how generous and hospitable the British people can be through gifts of money, gifts in kind and amazing offers of accommodation, is very heartening, especially in the face of potential financial hardship for many.

Warmer weather has also lightened the mood and we were particularly fortunate on Good Friday to have the best of the Easter warmth and sunshine, which enabled us to hold the service of Stations of the Cross in the churchyard. Each station was marked with at least one of Rev Max's brilliant drawings or icons. Later that day was the Walk of Witness around the village led by Rev Moji and bring and share refreshments following.

The warmer weather also makes the grass grow, and some may remember that we used to get a some churchyard maintenance from the Community Payback organisation. Since the advent of Covid this service has been curtailed due to the risk from vehicle sharing and now the management has been returned to the Probation Service who seem reluctant to answer telephone calls. Thankfully members of the Bulphan-in-Bloom team continue to look after this work and we are very fortunate to have their invaluable help. Meanwhile every effort is being made to get the Probation Service back.

If you tend a grave in the churchyard, it is worth noting that there are composting facilities on the North boundary and old plants, flowers and green material can be placed in the **righthand** section, rather than using the Brown Bin. Our thanks to Les Naulls who looks after the composting.

FUNDRAISING APPEAL

As mentioned on previous occasions, we are planning major conservation works to the church porch. I have now received consent from the Diocese to proceed with this. However, as with everything there is a cost involved and the total bill will be in excess of £22,000. We do have some of this money set aside and we will be seeking grants from a variety of organisations. However, it is very unlikely that we will be able to meet all of this without some form of local fundraising. We do appreciate that times are extremely difficult for many people facing a soaring cost of living, but if you do feel able to donate (however small), towards this essential project we will be extremely grateful. With appeals in the past, the residents of Bulphan have been outstandingly generous and enabled us to keep the church in good and safe condition and we appeal to that generosity now.

A Study of the Gospel of St Mark

Mark 1:21-34

O Lord, you have given us your word for a light to shine upon our path. Grant us so to meditate on that word, and to follow its teaching, that we may find in it the light that shines more and more until the perfect day; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

21 They went to Capernaum; and when the sabbath came, he entered the synagogue and taught. 22 They were astounded at his teaching, for he taught them as one having authority, and not as the scribes. 23 Just then there was in their synagogue a man with an unclean spirit, 24 and he cried out, 'What have you to do with us, Jesus of Nazareth? Have you come to destroy us? I know who you are, the Holy One of God.' 25 But Jesus rebuked him, saying, 'Be silent, and come out of him!' 26 And the unclean spirit, throwing him into convulsions and crying with a loud voice, came out of him. 27 They were all amazed, and they kept on asking one another, 'What is this? A new teaching—with authority! He commands even the unclean spirits, and they obey him.' 28 At once his fame began to spread throughout the surrounding region of Galilee.

29 As soon as they left the synagogue, they entered the house of Simon and Andrew, with James and John. 30 Now Simon's mother-in-law was in bed with a fever, and they told him about her at once. 31 He came and took her by the hand and lifted her up. Then the fever left her, and she began to serve them. 32 That evening, at sunset, they brought to him all who were sick or possessed with demons. 33 And the whole city was gathered around the door. 34 And he cured many who were sick with various diseases, and cast out many demons; and he would not permit the demons to speak, because they knew him.

So Mark, continuing his pacy narrative takes us 'immediately' to the synagogue at Capernaum. Jesus preaches, but with a personal authority, not like the scribes and rabbis, who always started by announcing that their authority came from Moses, the prophets or a famous rabbi. The authority with which Jesus preached came from HIs own relationship with His Father, and His own knowledge of scripture.

Immediately, there is a demoniac in the congregation who confronts Jesus.

'What have you to do with us, Jesus of Nazareth? Have you come to destroy us? I know who you are, the Holy One of God.' Jesus demonstrates His authority over the dark spirit realm by commanding the Demon to silence and to leave the man. Which of course, it does. Unlike humanity the 'unclean spirits' could see clearly who Jesus is, recognising both His power over them and HIs authority over spirits.

When they are in Simon Peter and Andrew's house, Simon's mother in law is not well. Jesus now shows His authority over illnesses and the physical body by healing her. News of this, and the exorcism race around Capernaum, and by evening there are crowds arriving for healing and exorcism. This is the beginning of the movement that will continue to attract followers throughout Galilee.

It is worth noting at this point that Jesus did not allow the demons to talk as He was trying to keep HIs movement a secret against the Priestly and Roman authorities. Nonetheless, the movement continues to grow.

Let us finish with prayer.





FAMOUS PERSON IN MAY

Her Imperial Majesty Queen Victoria Queen of Great Britain and Ireland, Empress of India Born May 24th 1819; Died January 22nd 1901

Victoria was born at Kensington Palace on May 24th 1819, the only child of HRH Edward Duke of Kent, fourth son of George III. His wife the Duchess was a royal widow, Princess Victoria Maria Louisa of Saxe-Coburg-Saalfeld. At the time of her birth, Victoria was fifth in line for the British crown.

Christened Alexandrina Victoria, HRH Princess Victoria of Kent spent most of her childhood at Kensington Palace and Claremont. Victoria's father died just eight months after she was born. Her grandfather, King George III, died six days later. Her uncle, the Prince of Wales, then inherited the Crown, becoming King George IV. He too died childless when Victoria was only 11. The crown then passed to his brother who became King William IV.



When King William IV died on June 20th 1837, Princess Victoria became queen at the age of

18. She was described as a "studious, thoughtful, accomplished, serious and quiet but cheerful girl". Lord Melbourne was prime minister at this time.

Victoria was crowned at Westminster Abbey on June the 28th, 1838. After the ceremony there were fire-works and a fair in Hyde Park, and that night most of the theatres in London were open free to the public.

Prince Albert of Saxe-Coburg-Gotha arrived in London on October 10th 1839. Albert belonged to the family of the Duchess of Kent and was the Queens first cousin. He was born on August 26th 1819 and visited England as a guest of his aunt the Duchess. At Kensington Palace, Albert shared lessons with his cousin Princess Victoria and they became firm friends.

On 15th November 1839 he returned to Germany and on the 23rd November Victoria summoned the Privy Council to Buckingham Palace to declare her intention to marry Prince Albert.

On February 10th 1840 the marriage was celebrated in the Chapel Royal of St James Palace. The Prince wore the uniform of a British field-marshal. The Queen wore white satin trimmed with orange flower blossoms, a bridal wreath and veil of Honiton lace.

Although Albert was formally titled "HRH Prince Albert", he was popularly known as "HRH the Prince Consort" for the next seventeen years. It wasn't until 29 June 1857 that Queen Victoria formally granted him the title Prince Consort.


Albert, the Prince Consort, died of typhoid fever on 14 December 1861 at Windsor Castle. His death completely devastated Queen Victoria who entered a state of mourning and wore black for the rest of her life. She avoided public appearances and was rarely seen by her people: she was widely criticised and her seclusion earned her the name "Widow of Windsor".

Victoria's self-imposed seclusion from public life affected the popularity of the monarchy. Although she did undertake some official government duties, she chose to remain secluded in her royal residences, Balmoral in Scotland, Osborne House on the Isle of Wight and Windsor Castle.

It wasn't until the early 1880s, after much coaxing by her family and Prime Minister Disraeli, that she began to appear more often in public, even attending the theatre in 1881.

As the British Empire flourished so Victoria became more popular with the people, indeed in her later years she became almost synonymous with the Empire. In 1887 The Golden Jubilee was a grand national celebration of her 50th year as Queen, so too the Diamond Jubilee in 1897 (60th anniversary of her accession to the throne). Victoria's long reign witnessed political and social reforms at home and the expansion of the British Empire abroad. The sense of national pride in both Queen and country led to the use of the term 'Victorian England'.

Victoria died at Osborne House on the Isle of Wight on 22 January 1901 after a reign which lasted almost 64 years. She was buried at Windsor beside Prince Albert, in the Frogmore Royal Mausoleum, which she had built for their final resting place. Above the Mausoleum door are inscribed Victoria's words: 'farewell best beloved, here at last I shall rest with thee, with thee in Christ I shall rise again'.

BUYING FAIRTRADE - COFFEE

When you choose Fairtrade coffee, not only can farmers build a better quality of life for their families and communities, they can invest in growing better quality beans too. Fairtrade coffee farmers invest at least 25 percent of their Fairtrade Premium in improving productivity and quality. Choose Fairtrade coffee and you're also supporting farmers to fight the challenges they may face. These include the effects of a changing climate, low and unpredictable incomes and in some coffee growing communities, there may not be enough food available for three to four months a year. Being part of Fairtrade has meant better knowledge about protecting the local environment and the chance to plant other crops and buy livestock to put more food on the table.

COFFEE FARMERS

Coffee is one of the world's most popular beverages and 80% of it is produced by 25 million smallholders. Around 125 million people worldwide depend on coffee for their livelihoods. It is one of the most valuable and widely traded tropical agricultural products and is mainly produced by smallholder farmers. Many of them however are unable to earn a reliable living from the coffee they produce. Coffee is well known for being a boom and bust commodity. Global coffee production varies from year to year according to weather conditions, disease and other factors, resulting in a coffee market that is inherently unstable and characterised by wide fluctuations in price. This price volatility has significant consequences for those who depend on coffee for their livelihood, making it difficult for growers to predict their income for the coming season and budget for their household and farming needs.

The coffee supply chain is complex as beans pass through the hands of growers, traders, processors, exporters, roasters, retailers until finally reaching the consumer. Most farmers have little idea of where their coffee goes or what price it ends up selling for. The more lucrative export of green coffee – beans that have been processed ready for export and roasting – is only an option for farmers who are able to form co-operatives, purchase processing equipment and organise export, or hire a contractor to carry out these services.

WHY IS FAIRTRADE IMPORTANT?

Fairtrade was started in response to the dire struggles of Mexican coffee farmers following the collapse of world coffee prices in the late 1980s. With Fairtrade, certified coffee producer organisations are guaranteed to receive at least the Fairtrade Minimum Price for their coffee, which aims to cover their costs of production and act as a safety net when market prices fall below a sustainable level. Through their producer organisations, farmers also receive the additional Fairtrade Premium to invest in business or community improvements.
At Fairtrade we care about improving quality, and Fairtrade coffee farmers must use at least 25 per cent of the Fairtrade Premium to enhance productivity and quality, for example by investing in processing facilities. In 2018, certified coffee farmers earned an estimated €76.6 million in Fairtrade Premiums that were invested in farmer services and community projects.

When you choose Fairtrade coffee, not only can farmers build a better quality of life for their families and communities, they can invest in growing better quality beans too.



When you buy coffee to drink at home please look for the Fairtrade logo. If you are out at a restaurant, cafe or even church you should ask if the coffee is Fairtrade.

HORNDON ON THE HILL SCHOOL

There are references to education in Horndon on the Hill going back just over 200 years.

1818 : "Population 378. No school. The poor have no means of education and would be happy to embrace them if offered."

Digest of Parochial Returns. Select Committee on Education of the Poor, 1818

1833 : "Population 511. Two Daily Schools: whereof one contains 6 males and 12 females; and the other (commenced 1830) 12 males and 11 females, all of whom receive instruction at the expense of their parents.

One Sunday School (commenced 1830) wherein 29 males and 32 females are instructed gratuitously."

House of Commons papers, Volume 41. Abstract of Education Returns 1833

The National Society was set up in 1811 to establish schools based on the teachings of the Church of England. The National Society's aim was to establish a National School in every parish of England and Wales.

From 1833, the state began to pay annual grants to the societies. The grants increased over time, but were accompanied by inspections and increasing demands from the state.

The old "National School" on the corner of Vincent Avenue, was founded in 1846 by the Vicar, the Rev^d James Trevitt. Prior to this, he and his wife had held a voluntary school in a small thatched cottage, teaching in the daytime and evening.

An entry in the 1846 Log Book reads: "The School Mistress to find her own coals, keep school clean, etc. furnish her own house, etc." (the present school house). "The Annual Subscriptions about £30 to pay for the children's clothing, necessary books and slates, and the remainder to go to the Teacher together with the children's pence - each paying 1d per week."

In August 1846 a request for builders to tender for building a school in Horndon was printed in the Chelmsford Chronicle.

By September 1847, £279 17s 3d had been raised towards the £350 cost of the School.

In 1848 there was no requirement for children to be educated and the education system was 'organised' by the Church and National Schools.

In White's Directory of 1848 mistress of the new National School was Elizabeth Stibbard aged 24 from Witham, it is probable that she started in 1847. She married a blacksmith in the village George Oakley, in 1850. The next recorded mistress in 1863 was Eliza A Strong from Limehouse. The old National School became the nursery for the primary school a few years ago.

The current school was completed in 1972, which means this year is its Silver Anniversary. The building work was made possible by the co-operation of the Chelmsford Diocesan Education Committee and Essex County Council, in consultation with the Department of Education and Science at an approximate cost of £58,000. The work was done under the direction of the County Architect and executed by AW Hardy & Co. of Southend on Sea.

The school was dedicated in a special service on Wednesday 17th May 1972 by the Bishop of Chelmsford, Right Rev^d (Albert) John Trillo. He was accompanied by a National Society Representative, the Diocesan Director of Church Schools, the Rural Dean of Orsett & Grays, Vicar of Horndon on the Hill (Rev^d MS Cherry), The Bishop of Colchester (Chairman of Diocesan Education Committee) and Horndon on the Hill Churchwardens.

After the service the Bishops presented the children with commemorative bibles and guests were invited to view the classrooms.
