

Rector's Reflections

Thank you to everyone who donated food for the foodbank at Harvest time. As a result of your generosity, we were able to take 396 kgs of food to the Foodbank to help those who are struggling financially at this time. Thank you, also, to those who decorated the churches so beautifully and to the farmers who provided seeds and wheat to display in our churches, and to those who provided refreshments after our Harvest services.

We know that this winter is not going to be easy for many people so, if you are able to continue supporting the Foodbank do remember that we have collection points for food in all three villages.

Over the past few weeks, we have also been doing an Alpha Course at the Woolmarket in Horndon. The course is due to finish in mid-November. I would like to thank all those who have made running this course possible.

The Alpha Course is designed to help people understand more about what it means to follow Jesus. It began in 1977 at Holy Trinity Church, Brompton and by 2017, over 26,000,000 people had tried Alpha in 100 countries and in over 100 languages and the number has increased since then.

Each Alpha session begins with cake and refreshments followed by a video and then we split into small groups for an informal discussion.

At each Alpha Course, the following topics are covered:

- Is there more to life than this?
- Who is Jesus
- Why did Jesus die?
- How can I have faith?
- Why and how do I pray?
- Why and how should I read the Bible?
- How does God guide us?
- Who is the Holy Spirit?
- What does the Holy Spirit do?
- How can I be filled with the Holy Spirit?
- How can I make the most of the rest of my life?
- How can I resist evil?
- Why and how should I tell others?
- Does God heal today?
- What about the Church?

Our course included a special day at Mulberry House, Essex in October.

It always is a privilege to walk alongside people on their faith journeys.

If you think you might be interested in attending an Alpha Course in the future, please do let me know.

I look forward to seeing you soon. Don't forget our Remembrance Services on 12th and 13th November.

Bulphan Churchwarden's Report

The works to the porch have started. Ron is overseeing the works; the porch appeal is still open as we are short of finances to complete the project, please contact Lynda if you feel able to donate.

I have always been in favour of sound money, people in the East End, including my mum, would each week pay the shopkeeper for items and when paid for would take them home. No credit or hire purchase then.

The same applies to many industries, unless the return on the money borrowed is significantly more than the rate at which the company borrows it, then that company will not survive in business for very long. The Church has to take a different approach as it incorporates different levels of deprivation within its calculations, if the Church based its calculations on whether a Church remains open on financial viability there would not be many Churches left open. The Church cannot continue in its present shape with income reducing and costs rising. There are those who say the Church has "loads of money and assets" and as far as assets are concerned this is true, but it also has significant costs of Clergy and Clergy pensions. The Church can only sell off a number of old rectories, it could sell its housing stock, but where then would the Priests live? There is no easy solution, in Thurrock the number of Priests is at a record low. We also have to consider the wellbeing of Priests which means that fewer Priests cannot maintain the present workload.

If the only way to save costs, is to reduce priest numbers, then with fewer services long term there will not be an economic case for keeping some Churches open full time.

Chelmsford Diocese has not been an established Diocese for as long as many others and does not have vast reserves. The Chief Executive of Chelmsford Diocese confirms that the Diocese will be "self-sustaining" by 2025.

We can all help by looking at our giving [not a good time with our own personal costs of energy and food rising]. We are all urged to join the Parish Giving Scheme so that at least there can be a guaranteed income.

For all of us a terrible time, my grandmother who was killed by a doodlebug V1 rocket in 1944, probably never saw me. The drones flying over Ukraine are reminiscent of this.

The fundamentals of our Christian belief in love and forgiveness are taking a battering at present but those of us of faith are reassured that good overcomes evil and light overcomes darkness.




Baptism Preparation












Bonfire Night

Bonfire, Guy Fawkes or Fireworks Night is uniquely a British event. It marks the successful prevention of a plot to blow up King James I and Parliament by Catholic subversives in 1605. The fireworks are a reminder of the gunpowder that was placed by the plotters under the Houses of Parliament.

Bonfire night was and is an exciting night for children. Like most things it has changed. In the last 40 years it has become increasingly marked with a trip to an organised bonfire and or firework display which run weeks before November 5th and just after.

Before this Bonfire Night was an on the night hands-on celebration, that happened at most one or two days either side of November 5th. Family bonfire parties and get-togethers with neighbours were very much the thing, with people watching each others fireworks. There were organised displays, but the majority of people were content with their garden displays. Health and safety is very much to the fore now which is why the family events have become less prominent. In the past apart from public information films and Blue Peter's annual advice, common sense was the order of the day.

Wood for the bonfire would be collected a few weeks before the night. The bonfire was quite



a competitive thing with the neighbours and had to be a 'good fire', preferably larger and brighter than next doors.

Fireworks appeared in the shops 2 to 3 weeks or so before November 5th. The mainstay was selection boxes of fireworks (the most popular brand was Standard Fireworks) and you could buy packs of individual fireworks. Catherine Wheels, Rockets and Roman Candles were particularly popular, as were sparklers and bangers. The fireworks were not as has become the trend in the last couple of decades for

ground and air shaking explosions, but very much smaller bangs, fizzes and colours. 'Penny for the Guy' where the guy (a 'model' of Guy Fawkes), would be made from straw, newspapers and material stuffed into old clothes, displayed by children who would ask for small amounts of change from passers-by. The money given to the children would be mainly spent fireworks, but also sweets, chips, drink etc. In 2004, it became an offence to supply fireworks to anyone under the age of 18.

Food was very much a part of bonfire parties; sausages, toffee apples and parkin, a sort of gingerbread. Potatoes were baked in the ashes of the fire and served with butter. Rarely baked successfully but they tasted nice on a cold night. Mugs of hot soup, Bovril or OXO helped warm hands and stomachs standing around the fire.

On November 5th, as soon as it was dark, the fun would begin. The guy would be placed on top of the bonfire before lighting. If it had been raining over the past few days, the wood might be wet and difficult to light. It was been known for petrol or paraffin to be used as an aid to lighting which would create it's own excitement.

The boxes of fireworks would be kept under the careful care of an adult. Catherine Wheels would be nailed to a wooden fence or a tree – often a recipe for disaster, because if not nailed securely, they could launch themselves spinning into the air, although for many they never really worked and rockets would be put in a milk bottle as a launchpad.

A Study of the Gospel of St Mark. 2:18-21

O Lord, you have given us your word for a light to shine upon our path.
Grant us so to meditate on that word, and to follow its teaching, that we may find in it the light that shines more and more until the perfect day; through Jesus Christ our Lord.

Jesus Questioned About Fasting

18 Now John's disciples and the Pharisees were fasting. Some people came and asked Jesus, "How is it that John's disciples and the disciples of the Pharisees are fasting, but yours are not?"

19 Jesus answered, "How can the guests of the bridegroom fast while he is with them? They cannot, so long as they have him with them. 20 But the time will come when the bridegroom will be taken from them, and on that day they will fast.

21 "No one sews a patch of unshrunk cloth on an old garment. Otherwise, the new piece will pull away from the old, making the tear worse. 22 And no one pours new wine into old wineskins. Otherwise, the wine will burst the skins, and both the wine and the wineskins will be ruined. No, they pour new wine into new wineskins.

Although John the Baptist was the forerunner, and also had the spirit of Elijah, he was still and old covenant prophet. Jesus is clear on this. John had to prophesy the arrival of Jesus, but was tied still to the Torah. Jesus was bearer of the new covenant and fulfils the Torah. He will seal that on the cross and through the resurrection, so at this time John and his followers would fast, as did the Pharisees for the same reason, to prepare for the coming Messiah. As Jesus is the Messiah, there is no need for HIs followers to fast as He is with them. Jesus uses the image of the bridegroom to represent the Christ.

When He is lifted up the new will arrive, there will be no need to wrap it up in the clothes of the old. The New Covenant will outgrow the wine skin of the Torah and the Old Covenant.

The words of Jesus here would have made little sense to the scribes and Pharisees, as they were still in the old covenant world view.

Let us finish with prayer.

Gelasian Sacramentary (8th century)
O Holy Spirit, giver of light and life,

Chelmsford Diocese Mothers' Union (CDMU)






There's some exciting news to share - Mothers' Union is partnering up with Women's Aid for a campaign against domestic abuse!

An estimated 1.6 million women experience domestic abuse every year. Though that's only the tip of the iceberg, as many women don't report abuse due to fear of being judged or not

believed. One in seven children and young people under the age of 18 will have lived with domestic violence at some point in their childhood. Three women are killed each fortnight by a current or ex-partner highlighting that so much change is needed before women and children are safe. **Mothers' Union and Women's Aid are working together so that no girl has to be a victim of domestic abuse.**

Mothers' Union is the first national charity to partner with Women's Aid Federation of England in this new campaign demonstrating how we can make a difference on this important issue if we all come together. There is no magic wand, as domestic abuse affects people throughout society and at every stage of life, but by coming together Mothers' Union Members are committing to raise awareness, dispel myths and take action to End Domestic Abuse.





For many advent means opening a "window" in packaging to reveal a picture or treat or gift of some kind (mostly chocolate) starting on December 1st and finishing on Christmas Eve. Although some extend to Christmas Day and even New Year's Day.

In the Christian faith Advent is the start of the liturgical year and marks the period of anticipation of the birth of Jesus. The word advent comes from the Latin term adventus meaning "arrival" or "coming," particularly the coming of something having great importance. Advent season, then, is both a time of joy-filled, anticipatory celebration of the arrival of Jesus Christ and a preparatory period of repentance, meditation, and penance.

In Western Christianity, Advent begins on the fourth Sunday before Christmas Day, or the Sunday which falls closest to November 30th, and lasts until Christmas Eve. When Christmas Eve falls on a Sunday, it is the last or fourth Sunday of Advent. Thus, the actual season of Advent can last anywhere from 22-28 days.

One of the traditions is the Advent Wreath a circle of evergreens as a symbol of everlasting life and a circle to represent God's eternity and unity. This is adorned with candles, usually three violet or purple and one pink, the pink candle being lit on the Third Sunday of Advent, called Gaudete Sunday. Many mistake this to represent Mary, because it is pink. Some add a fifth candle (white), known as the Christ Candle, in the middle of the wreath, to be lit on Christmas Eve or Day.



What the candles symbolise, has several interpretations as to what they represent, two versions of these:

The readings and prayers for each Sunday of Advent reflect what the candle represents.

An addition to the Advent season in many churches is Christingle.

What is Christingle?

Christingle is a joyful celebration that brings families and communities together to share the light of Jesus and spread a message of hope.

Christingle celebrations are named after the Christingles that are lit during the service. Christingles are oranges wrapped in red tape, decorated with dried fruit or sweets, with a candle on the top.

There is no one way to hold a Christingle celebration. Since the pandemic and lockdowns people have still held Christingles services in new and innovative ways.

Christingles are usually held from the end of November through to February (Advent to Candlemas), with Christmas Eve being a particularly popular time for services.

During the service, each person takes a Christingle and the candles are lit to create a warm, magical glow symbolising the light of Christ and bringing hope to people living in darkness.

Christingles are made using oranges and a few other bits, as you choose. Each part of a Christingle has a special meaning and helps to tell the Christian story:

- The orange represents the world
- The red ribbon (or tape) symbolises the love and blood of Christ
- The sweets and dried fruit represent all of God's creations
- The lit candle represents Jesus's light in the world, bringing hope to people living in darkness.



The idea of Christingle came from a Moravian Church in Germany in 1747. The minister, John de Watteville, gave children at the service a lighted candle with a red ribbon around it. This represented Jesus being the light of the world and the final prayer of that first service was "Lord Jesus, kindle a flame in these children's hearts, that theirs like Thine become". The custom went around the world with the church. Missionaries brought the Moravian Church to England in the late 1700s.

In England the Children's Society (one of the earliest children's charities in the UK), with strong connections with the Church of England, have promoted Christingle. The first Christingle service held in the Church of England was in 1968, although some services seem to have been held earlier in at least one Church of England church. The idea came from John Pensom known as "Mr Christingle"! People thought the service wouldn't work as making the Christingles would be too complicated. The custom has spread through to all kinds of churches and has become is one of the most common and popular Christmas services in the UK. In the UK it is not only a chance to come together and celebrate what Jesus represents and have a tasty treat, it is also an opportunity to raise money for the Children's Society for their work with less fortunate children across the UK.

Thameside Nature Discovery Park

Thameside Nature Discovery Park winter musings.

Those who think winter is a time for hibernation may not be aware of just how busy this time of the year is at Thameside Nature Discovery Park! We have a multitude of visitors from the animal kingdom. Over the coming months we will enjoy the migratory waders like black tailed godwit and greenshank congregating on the mudflats which you can view from the hide adjacent or from the warmth and comfort of the Nature Discovery Centre Café, which overlooks the feeding grounds and River Thames beyond. Also, on view from the magnificent roof terrace of the centre are our resident peregrine falcons, who have chosen to nest on a redundant riverfront crane! Regular hunters include the marsh harrier and sparrowhawk, and we are usually treated to an afternoon display from the short-eared owl! Smaller, passerine, birds you can expect to see include redpoll, chiff chaff, siskin and yellowhammer. Our experiment with over winter grazing has been successful in its first year. This year we have 14 cattle on site, currently working their magic in the Coronation Meadow, which saw record variety of wildflowers this year and stable numbers of skylark choosing to nest in the bare patches left by their chewing of the cud! By the time you read this, the cows may be roaming the wider site, helping us manage the longer grassland, maintaining vital habitat for reptiles and small mammals, both of which in turn attract the raptors! Our Rangers and volunteers have been busy refreshing and adding to our manmade Reptile hibernacula, as well as adding a network of mini-meadows for the benefit of both our common and rare invertebrate visitors next spring.

Our special occasions over the next few weeks include our fireworks viewing night on Saturday 5th Nov where we will be staying open late to enjoy the view of the Thames corridor displays (no fireworks on the park) please call the centre to pay your £5 ticket which includes a Hot Chocolate! If you'd like to contribute some time in the outdoors, there are bulb planting session in the morning and afternoon of the 12th and 26th November - again call the centre to let us know if you can help out? On the 19th November there will be a festive shopping opportunity with discounted items in the shop, special offers, local traders, as well as at least one school choir (we are looking for more!) and professional musical entertainment in the evening as we are open to 7.30pm

We are equally excited to be welcoming Mother Christmas to the park this year, she will be lightening her husband's workload by meeting our young festive visitors between the 17 and 23 December; taking note of their Christmas wishes and sharing the secret recipe of his favourite seasonal snack for them to bake at home before his visit on Christmas eve! At the same time visitors can toast a merry marshmallow on an open fire, make a crafty decoration and follow an exclusive yuletide trail. 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
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FAMOUS PERSON IN NOVEMBER

LUDOVIC KENNEDY

November 1919 - October 2009



Ludovic (Ludo) Henry Coverley Kennedy was educated at Eton College and at Oxford University (Christs Church), Oxford. He gained the rank of Lieutenant in the service of the Royal Naval Volunteer Reserve. He fought in the Second World War between 1939 and 1945. He wrote the book "Sub-Lieutenant", published in 1942. He graduated from Oxford University in 1948 with the degree of Master of Arts (M.A.). He was the librarian between 1948-49 at Ashbridge College.

Meat" (published 1953), and "Murder Story" (published 1954). He was a newscaster for ITN between 1956 and 1958. He held the office of Chancellor of the Navy Records Society between 1957 and 1960. In 1958 he fought the Rochdale by-election, as a Liberal candidate. In 1959 he fought for the Rochdale seat in the general election, again as a Liberal candidate.

He was a commentator and TV presenter for BBC, ITA, ATV, ABC and Yorkshire TV, on various shows including Panorama, Face the Press, 24 Hours, Midweek, and Newsday between 1960 and 1979. He wrote the book "Ten Rillington Place" (which was published in 1961), "The Trial of Stephen Ward" (published 1964), "Very Lovely People" (published 1969). "Pursuit: the chase and sinking of the Bismarck" (published 1974), "A Presumption of Innocence: the amazing case of Patrick Meehan" (published 1975), "The Portland Spy Case" (published 1979), "Menace: the life and death of the Tirpitz" (published 1979), "Wicked Beyond Belief" (published 1980), "The Airman and the Carpenter" (published 1985), "On MY Way to the Club" (published 1989), "Euthanasia: the good death" (published 1990), "Truth to Tell" (published 1991), and "In Bed With an Elephant: a journey through Scotland's past and present" (published 1995).

Sir Ludovic Kennedy (knighted in 1994), was awarded honorary degrees by the Universities of Edinburgh, Strathclyde and Stirling. A joint portrait of Ludovic Kennedy and Moira Shearer, by the Israeli artist Avigdor Arikha, is now part of the permanent collection of the Scottish National Portrait Gallery.

He publicly supported the idea of euthanasia, and fell out of favour with the established political parties who did not support the view.

He called for Scottish independence from the United Kingdom.


He was a member of the crew of the British destroyer HMS Tartar when that ship took part in the pursuit and destruction of the German battleship Bismarck in May of 1941. He later wrote a book on the subject.


He undertook many campaigns on behalf of people who had been wrongly convicted of murder, including Derek Bentley and Timothy Evans. In many cases, his efforts were vindicated.


He had 4 children, Ailsa Margaret Kennedy (born August 11, 1952), Rachel Katherine Kennedy (born November 16, 1956), Fiona Jane Kennedy (born December 20, 1961) and Alastair Charles Coverley Kennedy (born February 10, 1963), with his wife, Moira Shearer, who died in January 2006.

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
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
