# Rector's Reflections

As I write this, we have just celebrated Mothering Sunday in the Parish.

Mothering Sunday happened to coincide with me having just finished a book entitled, 'The Lightless Sky: My journey to safety as a child refugee.' It is the true story of Gulwali Passarlay, part of whose account I had heard last year at the Greenbelt Festival where we attend as a family annually and where he had been invited to speak.

Gulwali, a Muslim, was sent away from Afghanistan by his mother, at the age of twelve, after his father was killed by the US Army. The story tracks his twelve-month journey to the UK. During this period, he spent time in prisons, suffered extreme hunger, endured a terrifying journey across the Mediterranean in a small boat and got separated, on many occasions, from the acquaintances he had made on the way. He spent a desolate month in the rat-infested 'Jungle' at Calais, suffered burns on his face from trying to board a lorry loaded with chemicals in order to cross the Channel and finally made it here in the back of a refrigerated banana truck, mercifully the refrigeration having been turned off.

When Gulwali arrived in the UK, although he was, by this stage, thirteen, the authorities didn't believe him and thought he was older than sixteen, so initially he didn't get the support he needed. Eventually he was put into foster care and went on to achieve ten GCSEs, three A levels, won a place at university and was chosen to carry the Olympic torch in 2012. He now works as an ambassador for child refugees in this country.

I am guessing that, for most of us, it is hard to imagine the horrendous living situation which would drive a mother to send her son on a treacherous journey like this. But the reality, which is sadly that of many people in our world right now, became apparent as I read this book, which was profoundly moving; Gulwali was one of the few fortunate survivors. Throughout this story, Gulwali retained his Muslim faith and spoke of praying to God, on many occasions.

This true story has parallels with the Easter Story which we will be celebrating this month, where Mary, the mother of Jesus watched as her son was mocked, tortured and handed to the Roman Authorities before being crucified but who, ultimately, rose again in glory.

Many people have asked me recently, as a priest and a person of faith, what my view is on refugees and asylum policy as it has made headline news. I have always said that, as a Christian, a follower of the risen Christ, I think we should, as I believe Jesus would have done, respond compassionately, he himself being a refugee. However, I must confess I feel I have often responded inadequately because of my lack of first-hand knowledge of refugees and asylum seekers and their situations. When we read newspapers, they are usually written in a way to influence us one way or another. But this book was an honest account of how it was, not just for one person, but for the many people that this young boy encountered on his traumatic journey, and I found it an extremely informative albeit harrowing report.

I am writing these words to encourage you, before making up your mind on any situation, to offer it to God in prayer, to consider what Jesus would have to say on the matter, to be prepared to listen to the real-life stories of people and the opinions of others and, ultimately, to be prepared to be challenged and to stand up for what you believe, as a person of faith, to be right.

And, as we walk through Holy Week, encountering both the pain of the crucifixion on Good Friday and the hope and joy of the Resurrection, let us remember that Jesus Christ came to offer love and forgiveness for all.

I look forward to seeing you over the Easter Period.



Over the six weeks of Lent we have held Lent lunches in each of the Churches in the Parish, Orsett Churches Centre and Horndon Woolmarket. Starting on 25<sup>th</sup> February at St. Peter & St. Paul's Horndon with the last lunch being held in St. Mary's Parish room, Bulphan on 1<sup>st</sup> April.

Thank you to all who helped in any way to provide the lunches and of course, to all who came for lunch. I'll let everyone know how much we have raised for this project as soon as possible.

Money raised from the lunches is being sent to "The Great Green Wall". This is a huge initiative to increase the amount of arable land in the Sahel, the region bordering the Sahara desert. Eleven nations are investing in projects as varied as agroforestry to sustainable development. The Wall will combat land degradation and restore native plant life to the landscapes. The Great Green Wall will cover an area 15 kilometres (9 miles) wide and 7,775 kilometres (4.831 miles) long. If you want to find out more check out The Great Green Wall on your web browser.

This year's Lent course entitled "Travelling well together" was led by Reverend Sue, Moji and Max, and was held on Monday evenings at the Rectory. The sessions encouraged discussion, reflection and were thought provoking.

On Saturday 25<sup>th</sup> March a group of volunteers helped to plant a number of hedging saplings (90). These saplings, including dogwood, hazel, hawthorn and crab apple were supplied by The Woodland Trust (ordered by Phil Mann). These new hedging plants will provide a great habitat to encourage other plants and animals in St. Giles and All Saints Churchyard Orsett..

Forest Church is taking place on the first Saturday of every month at 4 O'clock. Each of these sessions include acts of worship, singing and an outdoor activity. All sessions are suitable for all ages. On Saturday 3<sup>rd</sup> June the activity will be to take part in the Count on Nature Survey. We would love you to join us to observe and record the plants, minibeasts and animals as part of Love your Burial Ground Week.

# ORSETT CHURCHWARDENS' REPORT

As the weather starts to warm up, albeit slowly, it's lovely to see the spring flowers emerging from hibernation. This is a strong reminder that Easter is on its way and new life reigns in abundance.

Just as the seasons move along so does church life. We have now erected a screen in the church, the purchase of which was possible thanks to a very kind donation. Screens in churches have become increasingly commonplace as worship styles change – enabling words of songs that aren't in hymn books to be projected, also helping to reduce the amount of paper we use. We realise that this will not be welcome by the entire congregation but the screen will help us to engage with different styles of worship, preparation for marriage and baptism, running courses and children's clubs.

On 3<sup>rd</sup> March we hosted the World Day of Prayer which was a great success, bringing people together not just from our church but also from different local churches – Methodist, Zion Mission and the Wellcome church who have started to worship in the Churches Centre. The service this year was organised by the women of Taiwan and afterwards we enjoyed a themed lunch which was enjoyed by those attending, although the wasabi cashews were an acquired taste.

We are in the very, very early stages of the process of reordering the church. We must not lose sight of the fact that our church's primary reason is for liturgical services, baptisms, marriages and funerals but in order to survive and become more sustainable we have to diversify and change our building accordingly. This will mostly be changing the inside of the church to create different areas which can be used for a range of activities and making the church more accessible, which in turn we hope will open up the building to the wider community. After meeting architects to discuss our thoughts and aspirations the PCC have appointed Thomas Ford & Partners to help us through the next stage and a small team to work with the architect has been formed. As with everything connected with the Church of England change and movement is on a geological scale and works like this are expensive, so this won't be happening quickly. Part of this researching the history of the church has been quite fascinating as it shows how the inside of the church, which many of us think has been like it for centuries, has changed regularly to accommodate the needs and thinking of the time.

As we move into the summer we will be holding events across the parish to raise funds and we hope you will join us. Keep an eye on the HOBNOB, noticeboards, notice sheets and social media for details.

Bishop Guli's theme for Lent was 'Travelling Well Together' and, our Parish certainly did just that!







# "I have heard about your faith" from Taiwan



On Friday 3rd March our parish prayers were shared in a wave all around the world. This year's service was written by the Christians of Taiwan. In this democratic "society of immigrants" all religions are accepted and tolerated. Out of 23.6 million people only 6% are Christian. Citizens do live in fear of losing their independence if China tries to take them over. So faith becomes a source of strength in the face of adversity and the other theme of the day's service was encouragement. The economy is largely based on production of semi-conductor chips. During the Covid Pandemic Taiwan supplied the world with protective equipment.

We gathered in the Lady Chapel of Orsett Church and were glad to see members of the Wellcome Church, who are taking responsibility for the Congregational Church when Minister Eric retires. At the end of our service Graham Hodgson accepted a candle to signify the Methodist Church in Horndon will be our venue for next year. This takes place on the first Friday of March 2024 and the service is written by Christians in Palestine.


#### Date and Cherry Gunge



## **FAMOUS PERSON IN APRIL**

## Sir Charles William Siemens



Original name **Carl Wilhelm Siemens**, (born April 4th 1823, Lenthe, Prussia - died November 19th 1883, London. A German-born English engineer and inventor, important in the development of the steel and telegraph industries.

After private tutoring, Siemens was sent to a commercial school at Lübeck in order to enter his uncle's bank. But his elder brother, Werner Siemens, deciding that engineering was more suitable, sent him to a technical school at Magdeburg for three years. Financed by his uncle, he then studied chemistry, physics, and mathematics for a year at the University of Göttingen, where his brother-in-law was a professor of chemistry. Through his brother's influence he became

an apprentice-student, without fee, in an engineering factory making steam engines in Magdeburg. While there, he determined to sell Werner's electroplating process; after modest success in Hamburg, William traveled to London, arriving in March 1843 with only a few pounds in cash. He sold the process to Elkingtons of Birmingham for £1,600. He returned to Germany to complete his studies and then went again to England in February 1844 with the intention of selling further inventions.

Finding that the patent laws in England were encouraging, William boldly decided to settle there as an inventor, but he found it difficult to make a living until his water meter, invented in 1851, began to earn large royalties. He could now afford an office in London and a house in Kensington, where he lived with his younger brothers, Carl (1829–1906) and August Friedrich (1826–1904), until his marriage in 1859 to Anne Gordon, the sister of an engineering professor at the University of Glasgow. The same year, he also received British citizenship.

Beginning in 1847, William and his brother Friedrich had attempted to apply to industrial processes the regenerative principle, by which heat escaping with waste gases was captured to heat the air supplied to a furnace, thus increasing efficiency. In 1861 William used this principle in his patent for the open-hearth furnace that was heated by gas produced by low-grade coal outside the furnace. This invention, first used in glassmaking, was soon widely applied in steelmaking and eventually supplanted the earlier Bessemer process of 1856. William's achievements were recognized by his membership in the Institution of Civil Engineers in 1860 and by his election as a fellow of the Royal Society in 1862. Tempted by the prospect of profits as well as royalties, he started his own steelworks at Landore, South Wales, in 1869; but, although it flourished for some years, he was losing money by the 1880s.

Meanwhile, he had made yet another reputation and fortune in electric telegraphy. Beginning in 1850, he had acted as English agent for his brother Werner's firm, Siemens & Halske of Berlin, a connection he maintained until 1858, when he became managing partner of the separate London firm founded under the same name; the firm was engaged in electrical testing for cable firms and in the manufacturing of apparatus. The English firm laid, in 1874, the electrical cable from Rio de Janeiro to Montevideo and, in 1875, the first direct link from Britain to the United States.

Thereafter, William worked on electric lighting and electric traction. He invented improvements in arc lights and had them installed in the British Museum and elsewhere. A few months before he died he was responsible for the Portrush electric railway in Northern Ireland. He played a full part in professional life: he acted as president of various professional organizations including the British Association for the Advancement of Science, received honorary degrees from various universities and many foreign orders, and was knighted in the year of his death. He left a large fortune but no children.




