Rector's Reflections

We recently held our Church Annual Meeting, so this month I have chosen to share my report for that gathering.

'The past year has seen a return to something of normality following the Covid Pandemic.

All of our worship, social/fundraising activities and Open Church/Oasis Café events are up and running very successfully again and our new Parish of Horndon, Orsett and Bulphan is established with one PCC. Thank you, so much, to everyone who has worked together to make all these things happen. We now also have Action Groups focusing on:

- Children and Young People
- Mission, Evangelism and Nurture
- Prayer
- Eco Church and Social Justice
- Communications
- Fund Raising
- Worship
- Finance
- Pastoral Care

Thank you to everyone who has volunteered their services in these groups. And may I just remind everyone that anyone who is on the Church Electoral Roll who wishes to join any of the first 6 of these groups is welcome to do so.

I would also like to express huge thanks to my clergy colleagues, Revd Max and Revd Moji. Revd Max officially retired in March but has kindly agreed to remain serving as a Priest in this Parish, with Permission to Officiate (PTO), and we thank Revd Moji for her loving ministry as a curate with us over the past 19 months. Moji will, sadly, be moving to Darlington in the summer, to be closer to her family, where she will complete her curacy. We will miss her and wish her, and her husband Yemi, God's blessings as they move on to pastures new.

Thank you, also, to the six Churchwardens, the PCC members, the Treasury Team, the Parish Administrator and all who serve in any other capacity in this Parish. All your hard work and commitment in the service of God and community is greatly appreciated. We give thanks to Pauline Cooper who has retired from her role as Wedding Coordinator after many years of service and to Ron Porter who has retired as PCC Secretary. We are also very grateful to the kind person who financed the new screen at Orsett Church which will enable us to show video clips and project song words.

It has been a privilege to serve in this Parish over the past year. It is so important to remember that, often, signs of God's blessings and shoots of growth can be found in the small things.

A few of the little, but significant, highlights of my year have been:

- Parishioners asking for information about the best Bible to buy.
- A group of men, who regularly attend Open Church at Horndon, one day, spontaneously getting the wooden crosses, made by one of them, out of their pockets and laying them on the table, as proof that they carry them with them every day.
- At a Refresh Service, each person present sharing a favourite Bible verse and telling everyone why it is important to them.
- At Christmas, when it was brought to my attention that someone in one of the villages who was not known to any
 of us was going to be alone at Christmas, two of the Churchwardens immediately saying, 'They can come to my
 house.'
- A largely lay led and funded Alpha Course where people came to faith.
- The request for a new Home Bible Study Group

These are just a few of the signs of God's Spirit at work amongst us and I am sure that each of us could give many more examples. Let us give thanks to God for all the blessings he has given us. Let's not forget, in our bigger plans, to look for God in the small things, and let's press on, together, in his strength, into the future.'

ORSETT CHURCHWARDENS REPORT



Our Easter schedule in Orsett commenced with Palm Sunday marking the entry of Jesus into Jerusalem. It is also the first day of Holy Week which runs to Easter Day the following Sunday. Between these is Maundy Thursday, a service which, this year, was also held at Orsett. Maundy Thursday commemorates The Last Supper where Jesus introduced the wine and bread to represent his blood and body to his disciples, which is used throughout the Christian Church in Holy Communion services. There are two further rituals associated with Maundy Thursday – the washing of feet, commemorating Jesus washing the feet of the disciples, which clergy undertake for members of the congregation and stripping the sanctuary where all items associated with liturgy are removed in silence by the clergy and the congregation leave in silence. The symbolism is that of Christ being stripped of his power prior to his crucifixion. It's a very moving service and one we recommend for next Easter.

In stark contrast earlier on Maundy Thursday, Orsett hosted the wedding of Jesse and Nkechi welcoming over 200 to witness their making of vows and joining together, which was a joyous and wonderful occasion.

In a few days the world will witness the coronation of King Charles III, the first coronation that the vast majority of us will have witnessed for a British monarch. Even though it is not being planned to be at the same level of the late Queen's coronation 70 years ago, it will still be a spectacle with all the royal pageantry, pomp and splendour that only Britain can do.

Since April 23rd Revd Sue has been on sabbatical walking The Camino de Santiago, we send her our best wishes for a successful pilgrimage and a safe return with many stories to tell in June.

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A Study of the Gospel of St Mark. 2:23-28

O Lord, you have given us your word for a light to shine upon our path.
Grant us so to meditate on that word, and to follow its teaching, that we may find in it the light that shines more and more until the perfect day; through Jesus Christ our Lord.

Amen.

23 One sabbath he was going through the cornfields; and as they made their way his disciples began to pluck heads of grain. 24 The Pharisees said to him, 'Look, why are they doing what is not lawful on the sabbath?' 25 And he said to them, 'Have you never read what David did when he and his companions were hungry and in need of food? 26 He entered the house of God, when Abiathar was high priest, and ate the bread of the Presence, which it is not lawful for any but the priests to eat, and he gave some to his companions.' 27 Then he said to them, 'The sabbath was made for humankind, and not humankind for the sabbath; 28 so the Son of Man is lord even of the sabbath.', not a fast. But then goes on to say that the bridegroom will eventually have to go away, at that point HIs friends will fast.

There 2 major points to observe in this passage. The disciples were defying the sabbath observance customs, and were therefore fair game for those who want to belittle the mission of Jesus and His disciples.

First Jesus continues to ignore many of the customs that were seen as 'law' to the Pharisees, in order to proclaim the imminence of the New Kingdom. When Jesus is King then these customs will not be needed, in fact they are getting in the way of God's purposes. So Jesus acts in a way that lessens their importance and places the importance of people ahead of them.

Secondly, Jesus is the King apparent. He is, as He says master of the Sabbath, and therefore, the laws that govern the Sabbath. He uses the story about King David, before he was crowned but after he was anointed by God and Samual, and the Priests' bread as an illustration of His own position, having been anointed by God at His baptism, but not yet enthroned. Jesus also uses this story to illustrate how, as King David looked after his followers, so He will look after His own.

In the kingdom of God people are more important than laws however religious.

Let us finish with prayer.

Gelasian Sacramentary (8th century)
O Holy Spirit, giver of light and life,
impart to us thoughts better than our own thoughts,
and prayers better than our own prayers,
and powers better than our own powers,
that we may spend and be spent
in the ways of love and goodness,
after the perfect image of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ.

Amen.

WOOLMARKET MUSIC





A DISAPPOINTMENT

Tea had just been concluded, when the startling intelligence arrived in the park that the bonfire, upon which many hours of careful work had been expended, was ablaze. Some irresponsible person or persons had, through spite, or sheer malevolence, set fire to it in broad daylight. A rush was made to the Recreation Ground half a mile away, buy by the time the Committee (Messrs T. Ridgwell, C. Moore and J. Wright) got there, the huge pile was tottering to a fall. It had been built in accordance with directions from the National Bonfire Committee, and was to have been lit from the top to last well. Diligent enquiries were made and there was the sort of look in each bonfire builder's eyes that one associates with a farmer who has lost some lambs. It would have been a bad half hour for the lambs who touched the bonfire, if they could have been found.

In the park once more, the prizes were distributed to the successful competitors by Mrs Corbet, to whom a vote of thanks was moved by Mr R.T. Stewart.



River & Sea Quality

Our sewer system carries rainwater, and wastewater from toilets, along the same pipes to the water treatment works. When there is too much rainfall, water companies are allowed to discharge overflow from these pipes into our rivers and seas.

The Environment Agency found that 90% of sewage monitors at seasides are broken. In many locations, they're not installed at all.

Rivers are affected too. Every single one of England's rivers now fails to meet safety standards, with few deemed to be in "good health". This is partly due to sewage flooding our waterways. But chemical and agricultural pollution also play a part.

HISTORIC EVENTS THAT HAPPENED IN MAY

1st May, 1707 The Union between England and Scotland was proclaimed, forming the United Kingdom of Great Britain. The union included Wales, which had been part of England since the 16th century. Today, the UK consists of Great Britain and Northern Ireland.

2nd May, 2011 U.S. Special Operations Forces killed Osama bin Laden during a raid on his secret compound in Abottabad, Pakistan. This marked the end of a decade-long manhunt for the leader of the terrorist organisation al-Qaeda, based in the Middle East. Bin Laden had ordered and arranged the September 11th 2001 terrorist attacks in which four American passenger jets were hijacked and crashed, killing nearly 3,000 people.

3rd May, 1841 New Zealand was declared a British colony. However, just 12 years later, in 1853, the British Parliament passed the New Zealand Constitution Act which granted the colony's settlers the right to self-govern. As a result, New Zealand was essentially independent in domestic matters from its earliest days as a British colony. While there's no fixed date of New Zealand's independence from the UK, the first step towards nationhood came in 1919 when New Zealand was given a seat in the newly founded League of Nations

4th May, 1471 King Edward IV's Yorkists defeated the Lancastrian force led by Margaret of Anjou at the Battle of Tewkesbury. Among those killed was Margaret's son Edward Prince of Wales, heir to the House of Lancaster – leaving Yorkist King Edward IV free to continue his reign unopposed.

5th May, 1818 Founder of communism, Karl Marx, was born in Treves, Germany. Marx was co-author of *Das Kapital and The Communist Manifesto*, both of which advocated for the end to private property. In its place, Marx suggested a system in which all workers owned all means of production, land, factories, and machinery.

5th May, 1821 French military leader, Napolean Bonaparte, died in exile on the remote British island of St Helena at the age of 51.

6th May, 1954 Twenty-five-year-old medical student Roger Bannister became the first man to run a mile in under four minutes at the Iffley Road Sports Ground in Oxford. Bannister's finishing time was 3 minutes and 59.4 seconds. Until this time, so many athletes had tried and failed to run a mile in less than four minutes that people had concluded it to be an impossibility. Before Bannister, the world record for one mile was 4 minutes and 1.3 seconds, set by Gunder Hagg of Sweden in 1945.

7th May, 1915 British passenger ship *Lusitania* was attacked and torpedoed by a German submarine off the Irish coast, six days after leaving New York for Liverpool. The ship sunk within 20 minutes of being hit and lost 1,198 of its 1,924 passengers. This included 114 Americans, which heightened anti-German sentiment in America and hastened America's entry into World War I.

7th May, 1945 Nazi Germany surrendered to the Allies at Rheims and World War II ended. VE (Victory in Europe) Day was celebrated across Europe and North America the following day. However, the conflict wasn't over yet as the war against Japan didn't end until August 1945 and the political, social, and economic impact of World War II was felt long after Germany and Japan had surrendered.

8th May, 1429 During the Hundred Years' War, 17-year-old French warrior maiden, Joan of Arc, led French forces to victory, relieving the city of Orleans which had been besieged by the English since October. At the age of 16, Joan said she heard the 'voices' of Christian saints telling her to help Charles (the French dauphin, who was the eldest son of the king of France) gain the French throne and expel the English from France. She went on to lead French forces into a number of great victories.

10th May, 1994 Nelson Mandela became the first black president of South Africa. Two week prior, more than 22 million people had casted ballots in South Africa's first ever multiracial parliamentary elections. For 27 years of his life, Mandela had been a political prisoner of the South African government. In his inaugural address, Mandela declared that "the time for the healing of wounds has come".

12th May, 1820 British nurse and public health activist Florence Nightingale was born in Florence, Italy. She volunteered to aid British troops in Turkey where she helped to significantly reduce the death rate for wounded and sick soldiers by improving hospital sanitary conditions. Florence Nightingale became acclaimed worldwide for her selfless devotion to nursing, her contributions to the development of modern nursing procedures, and for highlighting the dignity of nursing as a profession for women.

14th May, 1796 A smallpox vaccine was developed by a physician in rural England, Dr Edward Jenner. Jenner coined the term 'vaccination' for the new method of injecting a milder form of the disease into healthy people, resulting in immunity. Within 18 months, around 12,000 people in England had been vaccinated and the number of deaths caused by smallpox dropped by two-thirds.

14th May, 1686 German physiscist Gabriel Fahrenheit was borin in Danzig, Germany. Fahrenheit greatly improved the accuracy of thermometers by introducing the use of mercury to temperature reading. As a result, his familiar surname is now attached to one of the major temperature measurements scales.

19th May, 1536 Henry VIII's third wife Anne Boleyn was executed at the Tower of London after just three years on marriage on charges on adultery, incest, and conspiracy against the king. Henry VIII's marriage to Anne Boleyn changed the course of British history as, in order to divorce his first wife Catherone of Aragon, Henry broke with the Roman Catholic Church and named himself as the Supreme Head of what would become the Church of England. Just eleven days after Anne Boleyn was executed, King Henry VIII married Jane Seymour, a former lady-in-waiting to Anne.

26th May, 1940 The evacuation of Dunkirk began in order the save British troops trapped by advancing German armies on the North Coast of France.

By 2nd June, boats and vessels of all shapes and sizes had ferried 200,000 British and 140,000 French and Belgian soldiers across the English Channel.

27th May, 1657 Lord Protector Oliver Cromwell refused parliament's offer of the title of King of England. It's not known for sure why Cronwell did this, but historians have a few theories. While most MPs wanted Cromwell to accept the crown, the majority of army officers and soldiers didn't. Some historians think this influenced Cromwell's decision, while others believe he refused the crown because he thought a show of pride and ambition would offend God.

28th May, 1961 Amnesty International was founded by London lawyer Peter Berenson. Berenson read about the arrest of a group of students in Portugal before launching a one-year campaign to free them, which he called an Appeal for Amnesty. Today, Amnesty International has over one million members in 150 countries. The organisation works to free prisoners of conscience, stop the use of torute and death penality, and guarantee human rights for women.

29th May, 1660 With the crowning of Charles II, the English was monarchy restored. With the execution of Charles I in 1649, Parliament had got rid of the monarchy and formed a new republic under the leadership of Lord Protector Oliver Cromwell. Two notable historical events happened during Charles II's reign including a terrible plague in 1665, which was brought to an end by the Great Fire of London in 1666. The king was notorious for having many mistresses and is thought to have fathered 12 illegitimate children.

31st May, 1902 The Peace of Vereeniging ended the bitter colonial Boer War between the British Army and the Boers in South Africa, which involved 450,000 British troops fighting against 80,000 Boers. The war began with Britain's desire to unite the British territories in South Africa with the Boer Republic's, because the Boers (Afrikaans-speaking farmers) wanted to maintain their independence. The Peace of Vereeniging recognised British military administration over Boer territories and authorised a general amnesty for Boer troops.

Orsett Traditional Recipe Book - Flower Festival August 1994

Oh dear! Are there still Hot Cross Buns lurking in your bread bin? Why not use them up by making Joyce Hunt's recipe for a "Brown Bread Pudding"? A tasty twist on a favourite family pudding or even a special pudding for Coronation Day. I imagine King Charles and his late mother, our dear Queen Elizabeth, enjoyed a family recipe for the dessert on many occasions.

Brown Bread Pudding (Serves 4)

8 slices brown bread (or 4 hot cross buns, sliced in half)

2 tablespoons margarine

2 tablespoons marmalade

2 eggs

½ pint milk

3oz mixed dried fruit

1 teaspoon ground cinnamon

1 tablespoon light muscovado sugar

Pinch freshly grated nutmeg

Cooking time: 25-30 mins – Gas Mark 6, 400 degrees F, 200 degrees C.

Pre-heat the oven. Spread the hot cross buns or slices of bread with the margarine, then sandwich together with marmalade. Cut off crusts and slice into triangles. Arrange in a greased flan dish and scatter over the dried fruit. Beat together the eggs, milk, cinnamon and nutmeg and strain through a sieve over the pudding. Sprinkle over the sugar and bake for 25 – 30 mins until crisp and golden. Serve hot or warm.

May the church be transformed by the Holy Spirit, as we seek to fulfil God's mission on earth. Amen

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FAMOUS PERSON IN MAY

William Pitt the Younger

28th May 1759 - 23rd January 1806

Pitt the Younger was British prime minister during the French Revolutionary and Napoleonic wars and helped to define and strengthen the office of the prime minister.

William Pitt was born on 28 May 1759 in Kent; the son of the earl of Chatham (William Pitt the Elder), himself a famous statesman. Pitt studied at Cambridge University, graduating when he was 17. In early 1781, he was elected to parliament aged 21. In 1782, he became chancellor of the exchequer. The following years were marked by the battle between George III and the radical Charles Fox, whom the king detested. Matters deteriorated when Fox forged an alliance with the previously loyal Lord North. The two



men defeated the government and George was forced to ask them to take control. Fox became Pitt's lifelong political rival.


In December 1783, George III dismissed their coalition and asked Pitt to form a government. He was, at 24, the youngest man to become prime minister. He was immediately defeated in parliament but refused to resign. George III was prepared to abdicate rather than let Fox in again. In 1784, parliament was dissolved for a general election, which Pitt won. His government worked to restore public finances, severely strained by the cost of the American War of Independence and later by war with France. Pitt imposed new taxes - including Britain's first income tax - and reduced both smuggling and frauds. He also simplified customs and excise duties.


His other concerns were imperial and foreign policy. The India Act of 1784 asserted increased government power over the East India Company and the vast areas of India it controlled. But revolutionary France remained the greatest concern and in 1793, the French declared war on Britain.


In 1798, there was a rebellion in Ireland, influenced by the ideas of the French Revolution. Pitt had long felt that union of the two countries was necessary and brought in an Act of Union which came into effect in January 1801. Yet fierce royal opposition to his attempt to abolish restrictions on Catholicism in Ireland forced his resignation in 1801.

Three years later, with Napoleon threatening invasion, the king was forced to ask Pitt to form a government and he became prime minister again in May 1804. Thanks to Pitt's efforts, Britain joined the Third Coalition against France (made up of Austria, Russia and Sweden) and in 1805 the British inflicted a serious defeat on the French navy at the Battle of Trafalgar. However the Coalition collapsed and this imposed a severe strain on Pitt's already weakened health. He died on 23 January 1806 and was buried in Westminster Abbey.
