Bulphan Churchwarden's Report

Despite the slightly inclement weather the Coronation of King Charles III was a wonderful spectacle. From the crowds lining the streets of London, some of which had camped out over a number of nights to secure their spot on the route of the procession to the symbolism of the coronation ceremony there was much to witness.

King Charles has a bewildering number of responsibilities. As head of State and head of our Church please pray that the King will be able to dispense his duties to the best of his ability.

Events were held all over the country to celebrate the occasion including in St. Mary the Virgin, Bulphan where it was great to see people of all ages coming to ring the Church bells to join in the celebrations.

Also on Saturday the Coronation was live streamed in the village hall and in the evening a beacon was lit. These celebrations are wonderful occasions on which communities can come together.

There are works ongoing at the Church, Frank and Colin are carrying out a number of repairs within the Church building including filling, repairing/replacing lighting. Thanks to Frank and Colin for arranging and carrying out these works which along with the works recently carried out on the porch help to keep our beautiful Church in fantastic condition.

Bulphan Churchwarden's Report - Part II

We have witnessed history taking place with the Coronation of King Charles III on Saturday, 6th May 2023. Bulphan village certainly went for it and at 10.30am the bells at St Marys were rung for "Ring for the King". After a certain amount of reluctance, the many people who attended were soon ringing the bells and playing "Oranges and Lemons and Ode to Joy" on the carillon tubular bells. Later in the village hall there were two pipers and a town crier and at 8pm the beacon behind the village hall was lit.

The quinquennial inspection was carried out by the Architect, David Ferguson, his last one as he is now retiring. Fortunately, the Church is in good repair and the works that are to be carried out comprise, cleaning of gutters and down pipes, removing moss from the roof where possible and redecoration of sections of the walls in the nave and chancel and replaster where plaster has decayed. We have commenced the repair of the decayed plaster thanks to Colin from Horndon on the Hill. We have tried to replace the halogen strips in the lights to the tower and found that the ends of the terminals had corroded and it was agreed that we would replace the four lights with new LED which will be cheaper to run and low on maintenance. Mike Power the Archdeacon agreed to this.

The doors and benches to the porch will be commenced on 22nd May 2023.

The boilers were serviced on 20th April 2023.

Rector Sue left on 24th April 2023 for her 6-week sabbatical and will not return until 5th June 2023. We thank Rev Max and Rev Moji for continuing the services during this time.

We particularly thank all those including Bulphan in Bloom and the Macalle family for all their work in maintaining the Churchyard and supporting the Church.

Regrettably due to a lack of donations, to even cover the cost of our Rector, we rely upon volunteers. The suggestion that the Church has 'loads of money' couldn't be further from the truth. In my other role as Lay Chair of Thurrock Deanery we have already seen paid Priests reduced from twenty to ten and with the present rate of giving this could be reduced to seven. With twenty-two buildings within Thurrock Deanery this will inevitably mean some drastic measures will have to be taken as obviously fewer Priests cannot accommodate the same level of services.

It is appreciated that it is difficult for everybody with energy and food costs soaring everybody is cutting back and there is no easy answer.

We're sure you are used to seeing the half page advert that appears regularly in the Hobnob magazine letting folk know when our services are held, but this month we are grateful to have been given the opportunity to let you know more about what goes on inside the building.

The Interdenominational in our title means that Church embraces a range of Christian denominations, which in practice, means we invite Christians of different denominational backgrounds to preach and take our services within their own tradition. Ministers currently come from Anglican, Methodist, Baptist and Community Church backgrounds and within Horndon, Orsett and Bulphan these regularly include Rev Max, and until his retirement, Rev Yemi. Others are usually from churches in South Essex and some who have moved out of the area and who find themselves back in this part of the country. We are greatly indebted to all who give their time and energy in the service of God in taking our services.

Our services do not have a fixed liturgy, but nevertheless follow a structure including; prayer, Bible readings, preaching and teaching, and singing of hymns and songs in keeping with the tradition of the minister taking the service, and last about an hour. We are usually accompanied by an organist and generally use the 'Mission Praise' hymn book although other songs are included from time to time.

We trust we are a friendly bunch and offer a warm welcome to all in an informal setting. At most services we number around 10 - 12 folk but we may have considerably more at our special services at Easter, Christmas and Harvest. Here is a synopsis of some of our recent services this year:

On Palm Sunday we had a preacher/organist from Somerset who preached on Micah 2 and Revelation 5 on the subject of a culture of honour. On 16th April we had Rev Max and Scout the dog! He (Max) preached on Psalms 16 and 22 on the subject of what do we believe and what is the root of that belief. On 23rd April we had 10 people and one naughty wasp who stung one of us! That Sunday our preacher was also our faithful organist and he spoke on Matthew 8, the feast of the Pharisees. On 7th May, this being the day after the Coronation, the preacher spoke on Jesus as King. We were honoured to host the crown...well <u>a</u> crown as Rev Pholani (pictured) told us about a slightly smaller scale coronation service typical of a Zulu crowning in Zimbabwe.




We have capacity for up to 40 folk so please do come along and see us one Sunday evening and see for yourself how we worship, you will be most welcome... unless you are a wasp!







How Bulphan celebrated the Coronation

Bulphan's Coronation celebrations started on Saturday, 6th May in St. Mary the Virgin Church, where people of all ages accepted the invitation to "Ring for the King". They all had an opportunity to toll the large bell in the 15th century belfry, with its massive oak timbers, and also to operate the 5 carillon bells which date from 1891.


Then briskly to the village hall, where the ceremony was live-streamed onto the big screen, and we enjoyed the goodies from the bar and cafe, including some delicious Coronation quiche. The hall was, of course, bedecked with themed decorations and the bull on the village sign even had his Union Jack-et on.

As the procession left the Abbey, Jo and Sammie provided ceremonial piping and our village crier, Steve Benn, formally declared the following proclamation:

OYEZ, OYEZ, OYEZ: Now Bulphan shall hear, as I ring out this bell, The message it brings, in this place where we dwell. History repeats, on this May celebration. As Charles the Third, King of our nation, Has been crowned and confirmed our Monarch this day, As his mother and Sovereigns were, in times gone away. So now, as I proclaim and ring on this bell, To the King's family, from our families as well, Good wishes and desires for a successful reign, In a Kingdom, united, in hope, once again. LONG LIVE THE KING. Three cheers for KING CHARLES THE THIRD.



Saturday evening drew a very large crowd, as we lit our beacon for the third time since its installation for the Queen's Platinum Jubilee. Beacon master, Tom Neal, and his team again did a splendid job of laying the fire and lighting it at sundown.



Tom later added this second plaque on the beacon post.

After Saturday's unsettled weather, we were pleased to hold our picnic in the park in glorious sunshine on Sunday. It was lovely to see all the generations joining in. Live-streaming of the Coronation concert also proved popular - as did the bar!

On Monday, Ron Porter made a stately tour of the village in David Hale's 1953 Riley, to judge the bunting competition, while families took part in Bulphan in Bloom's litter pick and BiB volunteers trimmed (tamed?) the willow dome. Once the raffle was drawn and prizes presented, our Coronation weekend was over. The whole weekend was only made possible by the many cheerful and willing volunteers who made it happen.

Orsett Traditional Recipe Book – 1984

How did you get on with last month's tasty twist on a favourite family pudding? This month, how about using some of the wonderful summer fruits that we have to make this delicious pudding; the recipe was provided for the cookbook by Pam Baker, who sadly died last year.

Yummy Meringue 8oz digestive biscuits (can use any cheap biscuits that crushes easily) 3oz margarine 2 egg whites 2oz caster sugar 1lb any stewed fruit (or tin of pie filling)

Crush biscuits, melt margarine in saucepan, and stir in biscuit crumbs. Press firmly into large (up to 12") flat container. Refrigerate.

Whisk egg whites until stiff, add 1 tablespoon sugar, and whisk again. Fold in remaining sugar.

Spoon fruit (or pie filling) onto biscuit base, leaving approximately 1" all round. Cover with meringue topping, making sure the edges are covered.

Cook at Gas $\frac{1}{2}$ or $\frac{1}{2}$ (110-130 Electric) for 1.5 – 2 hours, until meringue is set. Can be served immediately if a hot dessert is required, or if preferred cold, leave it to cool for at least two hours.

THE ARCHDEACONRY OF WEST HAM Hitherto the "London-over-the-Border" has lain in the Archdeaconry of Essex. This Archdeaconry has comprised seventeen of the Rural Deaneries of the diocese. A new Archdeaconry has been formed lately under the style of the Archdeaconry of Southend, which will comprise ten of the 17 rural deaneries referred to. The rural deaneries of Barking, Chafford, Leyton, Orsett, Walthamstow, West Ham and Woodford rehaving become somewhat of a misnomer, the Archdeaconry of Essex will be called henceforth the Archdeaconry of West Ham. How and why to stop using Peat

Peatlands cover just 3% of the world's land surface but contain at least a quarter of the world's soil carbon; potentially more than is stored in all forests globally. Harvesting peat releases this stored carbon into the atmosphere and accelerates climate change. In the UK, nearly 80% of our remaining peatlands are in a degraded condition, and that degradation is responsible for an incredible 4% of our annual greenhouse gas



emissions. Destroying peatlands also destroys the fragile and unique ecosystems that depend on these wetland environments.

Most peat sold in the UK is used in compost. In recent years there have been numerous campaigns to ban horticultural peat. While some retailers and producers have voluntarily chosen to produce and sell peat-free compost and plants, there is as yet no legislation that prevents either the harvesting or the sale of peat. Peat is not an essential component of compost, and there is an increasing number of environmentally friendly alternatives. However, more than a third of all compost sold in the UK in 2021 was peat.

Quite simply, creating green spaces and growing plants using peat compost does not enhance the environment - it harms it. Even TV gardener Monty Don has described it as "environmental vandalism." He, and many others, are calling for a ban on horticultural peat.

What can we do to preserve peat?

First - stop buying products that contain peat. This generally includes compost, but you'll also need to check that any plants you buy have been grown in a peat-free medium. There are a number of ways you can do this:

- Peat-free compost is now widely available, and a number of big supermarkets have already pledged to go peat-free. The Co-op has already achieved this, Tesco and Morrisons have almost entirely phased it out.
- Stuck for an alternative? The RHS has excellent and comprehensive advice on choosing peat free compost.
- The Dogwood Days website has a list of peat-free nurseries in England, Wales and Scotland, displayed on an interactive map. This is a great place to start when sourcing plants for your site
- Make your own compost! It's easy to do, especially if you have an existing green space that produces plenty of plant offcuts and lawn trimmings. And that way you'll save the plastic that compost is typically packed in too.

Second - spread the word! Anyone who has a garden, balcony, allotment or houseplants may be using peat unnecessarily, and without knowing the damage it causes. Speak with family and friends,

FAMOUS PERSON IN JUNE John Rennie

7th June 1761 - 4th October 1821

Rennie's work on canals, aqueducts, bridges and dockyards mark him as one of the greatest engineers of his age.

Rennie was born on 7 June 1761, the fourth son of a prosperous farmer on the Phantassie estate near the village of East Linton, 20 miles east of Edinburgh. He played truant from school to watch what went on at the local millwright's workshop - run by the celebrated mechanic, Andrew Meikle, the inventor of the threshing machine - and began to work there when he was 12 years old, while



continuing his education. He studied at Edinburgh University and then worked for Boulton and Watt, a firm based near Birmingham which manufactured steam engines.

In 1791, Rennie moved to London and set up his own engineering business. His first works were canals, notably the Lancaster Canal (1792 - 1803), the Kennet & Avon Canal (1794 - 1810), and the Royal Military Canal (1804-1909), and also improving the drainage of the Norfolk fens.

Meanwhile Rennie also acquired experience as a bridge designer, using stone and cast iron to produce bridges with daringly wide arches. These included the Lune Aqueduct (1793 - 1797), Kelso Bridge (1800 - 1804), Waterloo Bridge (1811 - 1817), Southwark Bridge (1815 - 1819) and London Bridge (1824 - 1831), which was completed to Rennie's design by his son George after his death.

Rennie also worked on the development of docks and harbours for commercial purposes, including Grimsby (1797 - 1800), Leith (1801 - 1817) and the London Docks (1801 - 1821). His largest projects were the civil engineering works required as the Royal Navy began to build the infrastructure for its century of world domination, including Sheerness Dockyard (1813 - 1821) and the great breakwater at Plymouth (1812 - 1821). Rennie was also commissioned to give advice on other novel maritime structures, notably steam-powered dredgers, diving bells and the famous Bell Rock lighthouse.

Rennie died on 4 October 1821 and was buried in St Paul's Cathedral.

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
