Rectors Reflections

The past few weeks have been very busy, as the new academic year has got underway, and I would particularly like to thank the churchwardens and the many others at church who continue to work so hard to ensure that everything happens as it should.

We have just celebrated Harvest. Thank you to all our local farmers for all their hard work over the past few weeks and to everyone at Church who helped to make our Harvest Services and Celebration a successful and enjoyable occasion and to everyone who brought donations for the Thurrock Foodbank. Of course, as we celebrate Harvest, we are mindful of the people of Morocco following their devastating earthquake and the people of Libya following their terrible flooding and we remain acutely aware of our responsibility to care for creation. It is often those suffering the most, as a result of climate change, who have least contributed to it.

At the start of this academic year, we have just had notice of the Course in Christian Studies, CCS, run by Chelmsford Diocese. It is a great course, giving people the opportunity to meet with members of other churches and discuss many aspects of the Christian faith in a relaxed atmosphere.

'Since it began in 1987, over 3000 people from Essex and East London have joined the Course in Christian Studies. What has it given them? What could it give you?

The excitement of discovery and learning together: members bring their own varied stories and experiences and share them, finding new truth in themselves and in each other through lively discussion. Knowledge of the Bible and of the huge riches of Christian tradition, nurtured by tutors and textbooks, and whetting members' appetite for more knowledge - but not providing all the answers.

Delight in that biblical and Christian tradition, finding in it a field for imaginative and practical exploration, for wonder and worship and decision. Constructive reflection on the Bible and tradition and on the contemporary world: the Course does not shirk the hard questions posed by the Church's history or by believing in God and seeking peace and justice today. Spiritual Formation of both the local group and its individual members: the Course does not set out to convert or evangelise, but it is concerned with the whole life of prayer and activity and relationships - not just with the mind.

For those who desire it, the Course also provides a foundation for further education or training. This could be other local courses; it could be a degree or diploma. Or it could be training for a specific ministry in the Church including the ministry of: Licensed Lay Minister, Authorised Local Preacher, Pastoral Assistant, Lay Evangelist, or Priest.' Diane Hardy

CCS is available in local face to face groups or online and groups normally meet weekly. I thoroughly recommend the course and if you think this is something you may like to do, or you would like further information, I would be please to chat with you or put you in touch with someone from the Parish who has done the course. There are also some taster sessions, details of which are available later in the notices.

I'm sure most of you will have noticed the





Knowing and sharing the love of Jesus in the Church and community



Conkers are littering the roads, the fields have been harvested, "all is safely gathered in".

It is Autumn and we have the Harvest Festival in St Mary's Church, Bulphan on Sunday, 24th September 2023 at 10am.

Most of the works outlined in the Architects recent quinquennial report have been carried out, these include plastering, redecoration, glass, LED lights and notice boards.

The main items outstanding are the cleaning out and painting of the gutters and the removal of moss from the roof. We need a team of volunteers to carry out this which has been done previously.

We have met with Michelle Vanstone, probation Services, South Essex and have signed and returned the 20 odd pages of detailed risk assessment, we are hoping that a monthly visit from the Community Service for grass cutting, strimming and general gardening works will recommence. This hopefully will relieve some of the pressure on Bulphan in Bloom who have been carrying out these works since lockdown.

With the Probation Service responsibility does not go away completely as we have to have a presence at the Churchyard with each visit plus the Church has to provide fuel, oil, refreshments, etc.

We repeat the appeal for volunteers to provide the refreshments after the Bulphan services. We urgently need a rota for people to share this role now that Traudi has stepped down and it is unreasonable that Bev provides this on a permanent basis.

Chelmsford Diocese Mothers' Union (CDMU): Thoughts from our President, Maxine Paul:



"Well, I did it! I visited every church where a branch meets and quite a few extra churches where the branch represents more than one parish such as Billericay – 48 in total! And, what a wonderful time I've had doing it – meeting members, capturing pictures with banners, finding out about some really interesting churches, and hearing about all the wonderful restorations (Rayleigh) and reordering going on... In the process, I think I attended at least 12 cream teas, garden parties or lunches and one branch (Elm Park) even had four banners! I also got to hear about how you run your branches, the sort of support you might need in the future, how you've

been using the "Transformation – Now!" prayer and seeing hope turned into action at the food hubs and community cafes at two of the churches (Hutton and Highams Park).



There were a few churches where I was unable to meet anyone, but if the churches were open, I still managed a photo with the banner. If I missed you completely, perhaps you could take a photo of yourselves with your banner and pompoms to send me please and book me to come to one of your meetings later in the year. I raised just over £850 in sponsorship and branches sent us another £600+ raised in other ways for the "Summer of Hope" campaign and it's possible that more went straight to Mary Sumner House. This will be used by the team there to support dioceses in their work with AFIA, prisons, and parenting. I also made over 200 pompoms to distribute with love and the Summer of Hope prayer. Thank you one and all for contributing and making me so welcome wherever I went. At the side, I have shared a prayer from a little card for the "2020 Year of Cathedrals, Year of Pilgrimage" which I was given at Harlow Common Branch and summed up my little "pilgrimage" around CDMU branches."

Orsett Traditional Recipe Book - 1984



There must be dozens of recipes for fruit cake and a favourite of mine is what is often called a "Boiled Fruit Cake". In the Orsett Cookbook is a recipe shared by Irene Crossley — busy wife of the then Rector, Revd Hugh Crossley, and enthusiastic Mothers' Union member. It's called Uncle Fred's Fruit Cake — I wonder who Uncle Fred was!

Uncle Fred's Fruit Cake

1 beaten egg 4 oz margarine

8 oz self-raising flour 0.25-pint water or beer

12 oz mixed fruit 4 oz sugar

Put fruit, sugar, margarine and beer in saucepan, and simmer for 20 minutes. Let cool (overnight if possible). Add beaten eggs and flour. Turn into well-greased and lined 8-inch cake tin.

Cook at Gas Mark 4 (lower shelf) for about 1.5 hours

Living History

The three churches in our parish have been the centres of the community and family life for hundreds of years. Many families celebrating generations of baptisms and marriages, and, the sadder events marking the death of family, friends and neighbours. For some their passing is commemorated in the churches and graveyards, with monuments, plaques on walls, slabs on the floor, headstones and other ornaments. Also lists of vicars, whose tenures have lasted from a few months to several decades.

Since becoming a Churchwarden, during numerous visits I have had the time to look at these more often and, in more detail, than as a congregation member. As someone with a more vested interest questions arise -

- Who were these people with elaborate graves, monuments, plaques and slabs?
- What did they do?
- How involved were they in the church?

The internet can offer some information but this is scant, for many just a series of dates and little else.

As someone who has been researching his family tree for well over a decade, other questions come to mind, like :

- What has happened to their families?
- > Where are their families now?
- Do they perhaps unknowingly visit our churches and not know of their connection?

Well imagine the surprise when in early August Revd Sue had an enquiry about an ancestor, which she passed to me. This was an enquiry regarding of the early Lords of the Manor of Orsett. These held the survival of many in the area in their hands depending on their benevolence and management of the estate.

Their enquiry was about Johannes (John) Hatt who is the first Lord of the Manor of Orsett, that we know to have a monument in the church. The enquiry was to confirm that their 11 times Great Grandfather is the person they had researched, they had the right church and that the monument is still there. Which it is, in the north-east corner of the north chapel, which has been known by different names over the centuries, it is currently the Whitmore Chapel. The person making the enquiry lives in Iowa and now has photos of the monument. They visited London in early September, but were unable to get to Orsett. For one branch of John Hatt's family we at least know where they are.

Then a few days later another enquiry this time about relatives buried in Orsett and Bulphan, going back to the early 1800s, where the enquiry was to confirm their relatives were buried in the churchyards, which meant a walk around the churchyard and trawl through the relevant registers.

These enquiries show that the names we see carved in the 'monuments' of the long departed are relevant to people across the world and that the history of the churches is still very much alive.

THE TRAVAILS & TRAVELS OF A VICTORIAN POST BOX

Bulphan's much loved Victorian post box has something of a chequered history. Dating from between 1886 and 1901, it was first threatened with removal in 1986 when the GPO said that the aperture was too small. That particular issue ended up with Ofcom, who said that it could stay. For very many years it stood before the old village shop on the corner of Church Rd and Albert Rd, that is until Planning Consent was granted for two houses replacing the shop. That would have meant that the post box would have ultimately stood in somebody's front garden, so the Post Office agreed that it could be relocated near the Village Hall and new shop. Unfortunately those contracted to undertake the move believed that the Zion Chapel was the designated location and there it stood for a number of years, on a bend, causing sightline problems. Ultimately a further move was agreed and our wonderful post box now proudly stands at the Village Hall playing field approach; thanks in no small way to those who tookon the Post Office and won. The latest installers were so impressed with the level of love shown for the post box in the village, that they laid the bricks on the top in a Union Flag pattern.

No doubt the manufacturer: W T Allen & Co, would have been proud to see their cast-iron box beautifully restored. The company were manufacturing from 1881 until 1955.

FAMOUS PERSON IN OCTOBER

Edward Tudor (1537-1553)

Edward VI became king at the age of nine upon the death of his father, Henry VIII, and a Regency was created. Although he was intellectually precocious (fluent in Greek and Latin, he kept a full journal of his reign), he was not, however, physically robust.

His short reign was dominated by nobles using the Regency to strengthen their own positions. The King's Council, previously dominated by Henry, succumbed to



existing factionalism. On Henry's death, Edward Seymour, Earl of Hertford and soon to be Duke of Somerset, the new King's eldest uncle, became Protector.

Seymour was an able soldier; he led a punitive expedition against the Scots, for their failure to fulfil their promise to betroth Mary, Queen of Scots to Edward, which led to Seymour's victory at the Battle of Pinkie Cleugh in 1547 - although he failed to follow this up with satisfactory peace terms.

During Edward's reign, the Church of England became more explicitly Protestant - Edward himself was fiercely so. The Book of Common Prayer was introduced in 1549, aspects of Roman Catholic practices (including statues and stained glass) were eradicated and the marriage of clergy allowed. The imposition of the Prayer Book (which replaced Latin services with English) led to rebellions in Cornwall and Devon.

Despite his military ability, Seymour was too liberal to deal effectively with Kett's rebellion against land enclosures in Norfolk. Seymour was left isolated in the Council and the Duke of Northumberland subsequently overthrew him in 1551. Seymour was executed in 1552, an event which was only briefly mentioned by Edward in his diary: 'Today, the Duke of Somerset had his head cut off on Tower Hill.'

Northumberland took greater trouble to charm and influence Edward; his powerful position as Lord President of the Council was based on his personal ascendancy over the King. However, the young king was ailing. Northumberland hurriedly married his son Lord Guilford Dudley to Lady Jane Grey, one of Henry VIII's great-nieces and a claimant to the throne.

Edward accepted Jane as his heir and, on his death from tuberculosis in 1553, Jane assumed the throne.



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Facts about Bats

Following on from the recent bat spotting night at Orsett Church, these are a few facts about bats ...

- Bats are nocturnal they are active during the night, dusk, or dawn and they sleep during the day.
- They are the only true flying mammal.
- All British bats use echolocation to catch prey and to find their way about.
- As nocturnal animals, bats avoid direct competition with birds for food, few of which are nocturnal. Although owls can predate on bats, bats tend to fly when owls don't.
- Bats usually live in caves or trees. In North America and in Europe they live in people's houses, churches, barns or anywhere they can find a nook or cranny to shelter
- In Britain, ALL bats are protected under the Wildlife and Countryside Act it is illegal to kill or harm a bat or disturb the places where they sleep, and there are special rules about how you deal with them. Harming them can lead to fines of up to £5000 per bat and imprisonment.
- Bats are a successful group. They are the second largest order of mammals: there are more than 1,400 species (types) of bats worldwide. This means that 20% of all living mammal species one in five are bats.
- There are 18 species of bat in the Britain
- About 70% of bats are insectivores. The common pipistrelle is a successful example. Most of the rest are fruit-eaters (fruit bats). A few species suck blood (none live in Britain), and a few large ones are carnivorous.
- Bats live everywhere except the Arctic, Antarctic and a few oceanic islands.
- Traditionally, bats are divided into two groups. Microbats which mostly use echolocation and catch insects, but a few eat fish or drink blood. Megabats do not echolocate, and eat fruit or nectar.
- Bats can fly and find their food by listening to the outcoming echoes and sending out high-frequency squeaks even in total darkness.
- Tiger moths know when bats are hunting them from the noises the bats use for echolocation. Just as the bat is about to attack, the moth makes a series of clicks to jam the bat's sonar system
- Bats are mammals in the order Chiroptera, which means 'hand wing'.
- Each bat wing is actually a thin layer of skin stretched between four long fingers and a thumb! In fact, it isn't all that different to a human hand, or a crocodile's foot.
- Bats sleep upside-down. Scientists think this way of sleeping allows bats to easily escape from predators, as they can drop straight into flight.

- When in flight, a bat's hearts beat up to 1,000 times a minute!
- Bats are hugely important for people and the planet
- Bats are pollinators, just like bees and butterflies. Hundreds of plant species rely on bats to pollinate them, including fruits like bananas, avocados, mangos and the blue agave used to make Tequila. No bats, no Tequila. The bats that eat fruit poop out seeds, helping to disperse them so new plants will grow.
- Bats eat millions of insects every night, protecting people from diseases spread by insects and reducing the amount of pesticide that farmers need to use to keep their crops bug-free.
- A tiny pipistrelle can eat up to 3,000 insects in a night on the wing Bats usually only have one baby a year.
- Unlike other small mammals, bats are long-lived, a lifespan of 30 years is not uncommon. A Brandt's bat has been recorded at 41 years old, remarkable when it weighs about 7g.
- Although most bats feed over water, the Daubenton's is the aquatic star. Dubbed the 'water bat', it skims across reservoirs and lakes, plucking insects from the surface with its hairy feet.
- The Noctule is Britain's largest bat, weighing 40g (the same as five 50p's) nearly 10 times as much as the Common pipistrelle, which weighs about the same as one 5p.
- Bats have always been linked to churches. Almost since the first churches were built, they've probably been used by bats. Bats love these ancient buildings, the older the better, because unlike newer churches with their tightly fitting bricks and mortar, medieval churches are built with flint. Nothing is square, the mortar flakes, and nooks and crannies begin to appear. If you can get your finger into a gap, a bat can get through. Bats will squeeze under ridge tiles, gutters and even flashing, it's the roof they love best.

With a loss of woodland and more barns converted into airtight houses, old churches have increasingly become important sanctuaries for bats.
