Rector's Reflections

Recently, I went to the cinema to see 'One Life.' It is a very moving film based upon the true story of Sir Nicholas, 'Nicky' Winton, a young London broker who, in the months leading up to World War II, rescued 669 mainly Jewish children from the Nazis. In 1938, Nicky visited Prague and found families who had fled the Nazis in Germany and Austria, and who were living in desperate conditions with very little or no shelter and food, under threat of Nazi invasion. Winton put himself and others at risk as they undertook this bureaucratic and complicated operation to rescue these children.

This film reminded me of the story of Corrie ten Boom. Corrie and her family helped many Jewish people escape from the Nazis during the Holocaust in World War II, by hiding them in their home. They also put themselves at great risk. The family were subsequently caught, and sent to the Ravensbrück concentration camp. Eventually, Corrie remained the only survivor in her family, her sister and father having lost their lives in order to save the lives of others. Corrie's most famous book, *The Hiding Place*, is a biography that retells the remarkable story of her family's efforts and how Corrie and her family held on to their faith and shared the good news of Jesus with others during their time of incarceration.

Similarly, on the current Alpha Course, we heard the story of a Polish Roman Catholic Priest called Maximilian Kolbe who, because he had no dependents, volunteered to take the place of family man, Franciszek Gajowniczek in the starvation bunker at the German death camp of Auschwitz, and who later died of a lethal injection. The result of this was that Gajowniczek spent the rest of his life going round the world telling the story of what Kolbe had done for him. And, in 1982, the Pope described Kolbe's actions as 'a victory like that one by our Lord Jesus Christ.'

As we approach Easter, let's remember that just as Kolbe died for Gajowniczek, and others such as the ten Booms and Kolbe, risked or sacrificed their lives for the benefit of others, Jesus died on the cross for each one of us. He did this because of his great love for us and to enable the bad things we have thought, said or done in our lives to be forgiven and to allow us to continue in our Christian journey, free from guilt and shame.

So, this Easter, let's celebrate what our risen Lord Jesus has done for each one of us. In the words of a song by Noel Richards,

You laid aside your majesty,
gave up everything for me,
suffered at the hands of those you had created.
You took all my guilt and shame,
when you died and rose again:
now today you reign,
in heaven and earth exalted.
I really want to worship you, my Lord.
You have won my heart and I am yours
for ever and ever; I will love you.
You are the only one who died for me,
gave your life to set me free,
so I lift my voice to you in adoration.



Back on Saturday 10th February the PCC had an Awayday at Mulberry House in Ongar. Although several members unfortunately couldn't make the day, those that did took part in various workshops to look at 'Inclusivity and working together' by referring to bible verses and then applying them to what we do well and not so well in the parish. Splitting into small groups enabled us to explore the topic quite deeply and we came away with a lot more positives than negatives. Some of the team were able to present their output to the congregation at the Sunday church service held at Horndon.

The following Thursday Revd Sue held an Intersession session over at Bulphan. Those that attended looked at different styles of leading prayer which included the use of bubbles, globes and wool etc etc. It was a very thought provoking session with many ideas discussed. In the coming months some of the ideas will be used at services.

Lent lunches are again being offered this year by the Eco and Social Justice group with all funds raised going to Water Aid. As well as hearty organic soup there is also a Fairtrade hamper that is being raffled. All three villages will host a lunch. 



World Day of Prayer

HORNDON, ORSETT AND BULPHAN PRAYER GROUP

A Prayer group was set up in Autumn 2021 when we met on a monthly basis in the Churches Centre, Orsett to follow the Prayer Course. The Prayer Course is a series of 8 video sessions created by the 24-7 Prayer movement and features practical teaching on various aspects of prayer in a coffee table chat style. Sessions include Why Pray?, Adoration, Petition, Intercession, Unanswered Prayer, Contemplation, Listening and Spiritual Warfare.

The course is accessible to all through the internet on https://prayercourse.org/sessions/

Following these initial sessions, we have continued to meet monthly since Spring 2022 in Horndon, usually at the Woolmarket. A schedule of topics on which to focus our prayers is developed for the coming year. The topic for the month is to an extent selected by events that will be happening about the time of the meeting. So, for example, in May last year we were praying for our Nation, Leaders and King surrounding the Coronation and celebrations that were taking place. This year's topics we will be praying for are given below, and include in June, our Local community and organisations at the time of the Horndon Feast and Fayre, and in September, Schools and Education at the start of the academic year.

The topics below are just prompts, national, local and personal circumstances change fast so please feel free to come along and pray for whatever matter is on your heart.

The evenings are led by various leaders in a variety of styles. Typically, the first part of the meeting will include music, objects, symbols, activities or written 'pointers' for individuals to reflect upon and focus into matters for prayer. Often, we then come together to pray together as a group and frequently ideas for prayer are developed as one idea inspires the next. Other sessions are of a more contemplative nature.

Prayer may be silent or spoken. I am reminded by the hymn 'Prayer is the soul's sincere desire' by James Montgomery two verses of which are:

Prayer is the soul's sincere desire,

uttered or unexpressed; the motion of a hidden fire

that trembles in the breast.

Prayer is the simplest form of speech

that infant lips can try,

prayer the sublimest strains that reach

the Majesty on high.

Thank you - Di Bubb

It was lovely to see so many of the parish at the funeral for our mother, Di Bubb, on Friday 16 February. It was a beautiful sunny day, no rain and bird song, just like mum would have wanted. Although we were mourning her death, we were also celebrating her wonderful 94 years of life; many of them spent in Orsett at Hillview, and then in Bishop's Court. We particularly celebrated her 68 years in the Mothers' Union – she was Orsett MU branch leader for many years and helped set up the Edward Bear Toddler Group, and it was good to see both Edward Bears making an appearance at the funeral. Mum was a committed member of the congregation at St Giles and All Saints and took on many roles including Sacristan, Server, and member of the Choir. She also recognised the importance of supporting the other churches within the benefice (and latterly parish) and was often seen at St Peter and St Paul, Horndon, and St Mary's, Bulphan.

Mum had many links outside of the parish, particularly with the Mothers' Union in Myanmar (Burma) and a message from retired Bishop Wilme of Toungoo Diocese was read at the funeral. The coffin rested in between the MU banner and the altar frontal in the Lady Chapel that mum had embroidered, and Rector Sue wore one of the chasubles that also made. Very fitting we thought.

Mum asked for donations to be made to the work of the Mothers' Union and to the work of USPG in Myanmar. To date, over £1,500 has been donated across both charities, which is amazing so thank you. If anyone else would like to donate, please use the links below:

- ♣ Easter is the celebration of the resurrection of Jesus Christ in the Christian religion.
- Jesus' death is symbolic in that he died for our sins.
- Easter takes place on the first Sunday after Lent.
- Holy Week is the week leading up to Easter. It begins on Palm Sunday and ends on Easter Sunday.
- The first story of a rabbit (later named the "Easter Bunny") hiding eggs in a garden was published in 1680.
- *Easter" was named from the Anglo-Saxon goddess Eostre, according to the Venerable Bede in the book he wrote in the 8th century. This goddess in particular was known for spring time celebrations and fertility.
- ‡ Eggs have been seen as an ancient symbol of fertility, while springtime is considered to bring new life and rebirth.
- Easter is the oldest, and most important, Christian holiday. Very early Christians celebrated the resurrection of Jesus Christ every Sunday, until they decided to dedicate a full, annual day to him
- The UK's first chocolate egg was produced in 1873 by Fry's of Bristol.
- ₱ 70% of Easter sweets purchased is chocolate.
- Sales at Easter time make up 10% of UK chocolate spending for the whole year.
- The idea of the Easter bunny giving sweets and eggs is said to have originated in Germany during the middle ages.
- In medieval times, a festival of 'egg-throwing' that resembled the game of "hot potato" was held in church. The priest would throw a hard-boiled egg to one of the choir boys, then thrown from one choir boy to the next. When the clock struck 12, whoever held the egg, was the winner and got to keep the egg.
- Maundy money is distributed by the monarch during a Maundy Thursday service. The Monarch distributes gifts according to the number of years they have lived: this year, The King will be 75, and will distribute 75 pence worth of Maundy money to 75 men and 75 women in recognition for their contribution to community and to the church.



The small things <u>can</u> make a difference to our environment. To OUR local environment. To YOUR local environment.

A year or so ago, I found a stag beetle crawling in the Rectory garden - see photo. The nature of a clergy home means that the garden is mostly laid to lawn and sparsely vegetated with low maintenance shrubs. Under our shrubs and bushes, old leaves, twigs, pruning offcuts, and the odd discarded log collect. Apparently, this is the type of environment (stag) beetles love.

The stag beetle is the UK's largest beetle and is found in South East England, particularly in South and West London. It prefers woodland, but can be found in gardens, hedgerows and parks. The larvae depend on old trees and rotting wood to live in and feed on, and can take up to six years to develop before they turn into adults. Adults emerge in May with the sole purpose of mating and die in August once the eggs have been laid in a suitable piece of decaying wood.



Stag beetles are rare and threatened throughout northern Europe and the populations in the Thames Valley are some of the largest in the world. So consider setting aside an undisturbed space in your garden for a dead wood pile - bury some as the wood the young larvae feed on needs to be quite damp and rotten. Even wood chippings help make a useful stag beetle nursery and will also support a wide range of other insects and fungi. At Forest Church, we recently built some small log piles in Orsett Churchyard in the hope that we make the space more inviting for wildlife.

A wildlife corner is also good for encouraging biodiversity. This need not be just an overgrown, uncut, section of your lawn (but that can help) but could be a cultivated but informal flower bed sown with wildflower seeds or insect friendly plants.

No Mow May is a campaign to encourage people not to mow their lawns in the month of May – and to mow less during the summer. This allows daisies, buttercups, clover and other lawn based 'weeds' and wildflowers to bloom (and seed) and help feed pollinating insects as they are all in sharp decline. Joining in might mean not mowing all of the lawn or leaving just a small area uncut, but either way the aim is to let flowers bloom and provide nectar for pollinators.

But encouraging habitats in our gardens, allotments and churchyards will be less helpful to nature if we continue to use herbicides and pesticides. Rarely do our plants or crops get totally consumed by pests and perhaps we should try to use natural pest control methods e.g. planting more crops knowing some will be sacrificial, companion planting (marigolds with tomatoes; carrots with leeks; sage with brassicas, etc), or learning to accept the beauty of 'weeds'.
