Rector's Reflections

Thank you, so much, for all your harvest gifts and thank you to those of you who have managed to fill a shoebox for our Link to Hope appeal. Your generosity is greatly appreciated.

As I write, we are approaching All Saints' Day and Remembrance Sunday, for which our services, this year, will be very different from past years but, hopefully, thought provoking and meaningful. In fact, much of what we are doing in church is simplified at the moment and whilst sad that we are unable to accommodate as many people as we would like in services, the simplicity can sometimes draw us back to why we are there in the first place, to the God we worship, and to our dependence upon him. I have recently presided at a few simple weddings with only a handful of people and, in many ways, the minimalistic approach has helped us all to focus upon God and his desire to be an intrinsic part of our lives.

Last month we held our first Forest Church. We were all there in simplicity, in the elements, the wind and a few drops of rain but warmed by a fire and the knowledge that God was with us. The next one will be at Bulphan Churchyard on Saturday November 14th at 4pm. Do come along if you are able and remember to bring something to sit on!

God is with us in whatever we face at the moment. But God also calls us to act on his behalf. At a recent clergy study day led by Bishop John, our Area Bishop, we were reminded that, although we are in the midst of the coronavirus pandemic, which we are all hoping and praying will come to an end soon, this doesn't mean that all crises are over; far from it. We are currently also in the middle of an ecological crisis, an equality crisis, a refugee crisis and a homeless crisis, to name just a few. So even when the coronavirus subsides, as Christians and churches, we have a responsibility to work to end all suffering.

With regard to the climate crisis, the Church of England is aiming to be Carbon Neutral by 2030 and our churches in this Benefice have also signed up to become Eco Churches. One of the ways in which we are working towards this is to use less paper. As a result, you will soon be receiving a letter asking if you would consider receiving our online version of the Hobnob magazine instead of a paper copy. Our online magazine has been developed by David Mortimer and Ron Porter and is looking great. If you haven't yet found it, you can find it at hobnob.org.uk/magazine We fully understand that some people need to receive a paper copy because they have no access to technology and that some copies are put in local hostelries and surgeries etc, but please, if you do have access to technology, do consider the future of our planet, the beautiful world which God has given to us and our responsibility to preserve this for our children's children, when you make your decision.

We are also in the process of considering our service pattern for the future in order to engage with as many people as possible and a questionnaire has been devised to be sent out to everyone on our database. The first one sent out had some problems so is going to be reissued very soon, using a different provider. If you receive this questionnaire, please could I ask you to take a couple of minutes to fill it in. In order for it to serve the purpose for which it was intended, it is important that as many people as possible complete it.

Thank you for your continued help and support and, as always, please be assured of my prayers for you at this time and do let me know of any pastoral needs.

October saw services resume in Bulphan church albeit in a scaled-down way. Covid-19 restrictions limit us to a congregation size of 14, which puts a regular Sunday service in jeopardy. But each first and third Thursday in the month there will be a service of Holy Communion at 10.00am. We have now had two services and both went well and I would particularly like to thank friends from Orsett and Horndon who were able to join us on these occasions. Hitherto, Thursday morning Communion alternated between Orsett and Horndon churches, but both PCCs graciously allowed Bulphan to take these so that we too might have a regular and manageable period of worship. We are most grateful for this, with thanks also to Reverend Sue and Reverend Max for celebrating this service.

This year Remembrance Sunday will be at 2.00pm at the war memorial. There will be no service in Bulphan, just the Act of Remembrance and wreath laying. Jo Goddard has kindly agreed to pipe the Last Post and Reveille.

THE SCIENCE OF FIREWORKS

Bonfire Night with the traditional fireworks brings Oohs and Aahs as they fizz and explode with a myriad of colours, and shapes But how and why do these things happen?

For a firework to have its desired effect, it requires a series of chemical reactions that usually happen one after another in a short space of time. By adding heat to the equation, it causes a chemical reaction in which solid compounds within the firework begin to burn with the oxygen in the air.

What creates the effects and colours in fireworks? These come from different metal salts that are contained within the fireworks. When these burn, they emit different colours depending on the compound, among these are: Strontium salts for red, Calcium salts for orange, Sodium salts for yellow, Barium salts for green, Copper salts for blue, Copper and Strontium compounds for purple, Aluminium for silver, Zirconium for 'waterfalls' and burning metals like Magnesium for white.

When you go to or see a large display, these are set up by people called Pyrotechnicians. Through their understanding of how fireworks work, they can control when the explosions happen, which, apart from creating a spectacular aerial display, gives them the ability to choreograph a fireworks display so that it is timed to happen during certain parts of a music track or show. This is all based on knowing how much energy is released during an explosion and also knowing how fast that energy gets released. They measure the velocity, launch



angle, speed and even air resistance in order to pinpoint exactly where the shells will travel and when they will explode so they can time it just right to the beat of the music. Pyrotechnicians will also work with people who design and make fireworks, to get the desired effects.

Most people will only think of Bonfire Night and New Year's Eve when they think about fireworks. However, the same technology is also used in more practical situations. Flares as used by the military or distress signals, work in almost the same way, although they use even brighter burning compounds such as magnesium, and are designed to burn for much longer. Some of these work underwater.

If anyone is planning to have fireworks at home this year please keep safe and be considerate and respectful of neighbours as many may not enjoy the barrage of ground shaking explosions, no matter how pretty.

FAMOUS PERSON IN NOVEMBER

George Eliot (Mary Ann Evans)



George Eliot was the pen name of Mary Ann Evans, one of the leading English novelists of the 19th century. Her novels, most famously 'Middlemarch', are celebrated for their realism and psychological insights.

George Eliot was born on 22 November 1819 in rural Warwickshire. When her mother died in 1836, Eliot left school to help run her father's household. In 1841, she moved with her father to Coventry and lived with him until his death in 1849. Eliot then travelled in Europe, eventually settling in

London.

In 1850, Eliot began contributing to the 'Westminster Review', a leading journal for philosophical radicals, and later became its editor. She was now at the centre of a literary circle through which she met George Henry Lewes, with whom she lived until his death in 1878. Lewes was married and their relationship caused a scandal. Eliot was shunned by friends and family.

Lewes encouraged Eliot to write. In 1856, she began 'Scenes of Clerical Life', stories about the people of her native Warwickshire, which were published in 'Blackwood's Magazine'. Her first novel, 'Adam Bede', followed in 1859 and was a great success. She used a male pen name to ensure her works were taken seriously in an era when female authors were usually associated with romantic novels.

Her other novels include 'The Mill on the Floss' (1860), 'Silas Marner' (1861), 'Romola' (1863), 'Middlemarch' (1872) and 'Daniel Deronda' (1876). The popularity of Eliot's novels brought social acceptance, and Lewes and Eliot's home became a meeting place for writers and intellectuals.

After Lewes' death Eliot married a friend, John Cross, who was 20 years her junior. She died on 22 December 1880 and was buried in Highgate Cemetery in north London.

The expense of opening the arch into the transept - an alteration which was considered as necessary by Dr. Haynes and the organ builders, and which certainly makes a great improvement in the appearance of the church-has also been defrayed by the same donor. The cost of the organ, with all its fittings, was £615 15s 6d., and the cost of erecting the arch, which was carried out by Mr. Middleton of Gravesend, and Mr C. Howard of Orsett, was £62 10s. The rector, churchwardens, parishioners and their friends raised £440, the builders of the allowed £20 for the organ material of the old instrument, Captain Wingfield generously contributed the balance.

We even managed to complete some form of induction for our new children, who started school in September-they have been great, considering they did not have all the opportunities that previous year groups had. It is just a shame that they have not been able to mix with the other children-I know that the year 6 children have missed being their "buddies".

We were all excited to see the children return to a "more normal" set up in September, although things were still restricted. Whilst the children are unable to mix beyond their bubble in school we have kept up with whole school worship (remotely).

We have successfully managed...

- To have a Harvest worship-led by Rev Sue- and thankfully families still donated food parcels for us to share with Thurrock Foodbank. Our donations came to 84kg worth of goods, so thank you to all. This is especially worthwhile at this time and allows us all to support our local community.
- Our year R, 3 & 5 road safety walks with some adaptations such as smaller groups and high-vis jackets.
- Rock Steady are still providing music lessons to the children, although these are now groups of individual classes, to coincide with keeping to the rules of not mixing the class bubbles.

As you read this I would have already left my position as Headteacher at Orsett, so wish to end this with a **BIG THANK YOU** to not only the children, parents and staff at the school but also the wider community, which I have thoroughly enjoyed being part of.

Everyone's support, and the links we have, has been a tremendous part of our school lives, and at times has been very humbling. Therefore, I wish to say good luck to you all and remember, in the words of Joe Hinchliffe: "New ideas, thoughts and inspiration will only take place when the mind is positive."

The room is looking amazing and we hope to add photos to our website very shortly.

Knitting

Some of you may remember that we asked for knitted blankets to send out to Australia during the wildfires earlier this year. The response was incredible, with children taking up the art of knitting across the school. Despite all our efforts we were unable to secure a flight that would take out donations, although the airlines were advertising this facility. On a really positive note, the blankets have not gone to waste, but to the animal hospital in Orsett Road.

We continue to get our WI magazine and this month's edition was a flyer showing that for new ladies wishing to join, membership is £10.50 for the year instead of £43.

We have zoom committee and members' meetings so that we can see each other and chat about what we are doing, how everyone is doing and this has proved to be very mentally uplifting for most of us. We know some ladies have found the technology difficult and telephone calls are put out to those members to check on them.

Orsett WI found out that Morrisons in grays are making a large display of poppies for memorial weekend in November and asked for any donations for poppies made from plastic, knitted, crocheted or material so of course we donated (see photo). These had to be with Morrisons by the 28th October.

If you would like to make some this is the knitted Poppy pattern:

Cast on 60 stitches using 4mm needles and red double-knit yarn.

Rows 1-8 (K2, P2) to end

Row 9 (K2 together) to end (30 stitches)

Row 10 (S2kpo) to end (10stitches)

Break off yarn leaving a long tail. Thread tail through remaining 10 stitches and pull tight, then fasten off yarn. Join edges of the poppy together and sew black button in the centre of the poppy.


We have monthly craft nights on the last Wednesday of the month.

Next month is a members only meeting where we will be taking part in a much-needed virtual pampering session with Neal's Yard samples to use at home.






