



Rector's Reflections

Happy New Year!

I hope that, despite Tier 4 restrictions, you were able to experience something of the light of Christ this Christmas. And I am sure that we are all joining together to pray that 2021 will see the light at the end of the tunnel with regard to the Covid-19 pandemic which swept across the world in 2020.

One piece of exciting news we received at the end of 2020 was that a new Bishop of Chelmsford has been appointed, Bishop Guli Francis-Dehqani. We look forward to Bishop Guli beginning her ministry amongst us later in the year. Currently serving as the first Bishop of Loughborough, she is married to Lee, a priest in the Church of England, and they have three children, the eldest in his final year at university and twins studying for their GCSEs.

Bishop Guli was born in Iran and moved here in 1980, following the Iranian Revolution and her brother's resultant murder. Originally with refugee status, she has lived here for 40 years and begun her working life at the BBC World Service Radio before being ordained.

When asked in an interview by Bishop Peter about what sort of Bishop we can expect, Bishop Guli reflected upon some of the words of St Ignatius: 'Bishops are best when they are silent...' By this she was conveying her desire to be a 'listening' bishop; a bishop who gathers the stories of the people and who prays for wisdom and compassion as she seeks to respond.

Bishop Peter also asked Bishop Guli what her priorities are. Although she doesn't come with a grand plan, she expressed 3 broad areas of focus.

1. For the Church to become more outward facing:

- to challenge the unjust structures in society and to be prepared to meet Christ in the unexpected places.
- to become less anxious and to sit light to internal differences and to think and speak well of one another.
- to become more diverse so that all are welcome and for us all to be open to the possibility of being changed so that, together, we can be transformed by Christ.
- 2. Commitment to the wellbeing of clergy and lay leaders so that they can cultivate communities where all of God's people can flourish.

3. Commitment to safeguarding.

In her spare time, Bishop Guli enjoys music, being with family, walking and relaxing with friends. In response to Bishop Peter's last question about which football team she supports, she correctly answered by saying that whilst she has been a lifelong supporter of Leicester, she looks forward to being a West Ham Supporter!

Bulphan Churchwarden's Report

It is difficult to imagine a Christmas more disappointing for so many, except perhaps during WWII, where the prospect of extreme food rationing and the uncertainty of the safety of loved ones away and fighting a war impacted greatly on families. I know from my own experiences of those times, always feeling hungry and not seeing my Dad for the first

time until I was three years old. At least today there is no rationing and where there is food shortage those wonderful Food Banks provide a very necessary service for families in difficulty and hardship. But can we remember that we are celebrating just for one day, the birth of Christ and the hope that he brings. Feasting and getting together with family or friends can be postponed and perhaps if circumstance allow, Easter might provide a suitable alternative.

As many will be aware, all Christmas services in our church buildings were cancelled and were replaced with online or Facebook services, it seemed the right thing to do despite Government guidelines allowing churches to open but in the same breath telling everyone to stay at home. Our clergy and churchwardens felt that it would be irresponsible to put people's health and wellbeing at risk by going ahead with the planned services.

Reverend Sue and Reverend Max had carefully planned Covid safe services before we moved into tier four and the mutated virus appeared. This involved much detailed planning and hard work, as it happened all in vain, nonetheless, we were well served with online services from Sue and Max and I would like to thank them for this. I would also like to thank Thomas Mann whose technology skills brought us these services via social media.

Sunday 13th December was the last opportunity for a service in Bulphan and this was in the form of an outdoor service with glow-sticks in lieu of our usual Christingle. It was cold and damp that evening, but no one seemed to mind but rather enjoyed very different and socially distanced service.

The best news ever for the New Year is that vaccine injections are being rolled-out and even though we will still have to keep vigilant and remain careful, it does bring hope for a safer and more comfortable time ahead.

FAMOUS PERSON IN JANUARY

BARBARA HEPWORTH



In full, **Dame Jocelyn Barbara Hepworth**, (born January 10, 1903, Wakefield, Yorkshire, England—died May 20, 1975, St. Ives, Cornwall), sculptor whose works were among the earliest abstract sculptures produced in England. Her lyrical forms and feeling for material made her one of the most influential sculptors of the mid-20th century.

Fascinated from early childhood with natural forms and textures, Hepworth decided at age 15 to become a

sculptor. In 1919 she enrolled in the Leeds School of Art, where she befriended fellow student Henry Moore. Their lifelong friendship and reciprocal influence were important factors in the parallel development of their careers.

Hepworth's earliest works were naturalistic with simplified features. Purely formal elements gradually gained greater importance for her until, by the early 1930s, her sculpture was entirely abstract. Works such as *Reclining Figure* (1932) resemble rounded biomorphic forms and natural stones; they seem to be the fruit of long weathering instead of the hard work with a chisel they actually represent. In 1933 Hepworth married (her second husband; the first was the sculptor John Skeaping) the English abstract painter Ben Nicholson, under whose influence she began to make severe, geometric pieces with straight edges and immaculate surfaces.

As Hepworth's sculpture matured during the late 1930s and '40s, she concentrated on the problem of the counterplay between mass and space. Pieces such as *Wave* (1943–44) became increasingly open, hollowed out, and perforated, so that the interior space is as important as the mass surrounding it. Her practice, increasingly frequent in her mature pieces, of painting the works' concave interiors further heightened this effect, while she accented and defined the sculptural voids by stretching strings taut across their openings.

During the 1950s Hepworth produced an experimental series called Groups, clusters of small anthropomorphic forms in marble so thin that their translucence creates a magical sense of inner life. In the next decade she was commissioned to do a number of sculptures approximately 20 feet (6 metres) high. Among the more successful of her works in this gigantic format is the geometric Four-Square (Walk Through) (1966).

Hepworth was made a Dame Commander of the Order of the British Empirein 1965. A Pictorial Autobiography was published in 1970 and reissued in 1993. She died in a fire in her home at St. Ives, Cornwall, in 1975; her home was preserved as the Barbara Hepworth Home and Sculpture Garden and is run by the Tate St. Ives, a branch of the Tate galleries.




ORSETT EDWARD BEAR TODDLER GROUP

Chelmsford Diocesan Mothers' Union AGM and Council Meeting

It was great that the previously scheduled meeting was able to go ahead on Tuesday 15 December and, due to the pandemic restrictions, the meeting was held using Zoom with nearly 40 members attending. Those at the meeting were able to watch a pre-recorded address from Bishop Peter which was an inspiring call to all of us to continue our work within the diocese and in particular to step up as we enter election year. Some key points to note for 2021:

- 2021 Membership fees have increased to £29.50 for Diocesan members and need to be paid by 31 January.
- Families First magazine will cease after the last edition this year and will be replaced in 2021 by the new
 membership magazine CONNECTED. There will be two copies a year which will be delivered to every
 member. All members should have received the new Prayer Diary for 2021 and advised that in following
 years this will be circulated with the new magazine.
- The MU theme for 2021 will be 'Re-Building Hope and Confidence' and Mary Sumner House will focus on four key campaigns next year:
 - 1. Make a Mother's Day. Between the 8th and 14th March, there will be seven days of prayers and meditations.
 - 2. Summer of Hope. 100 years since Mary Sumner died.
 - 3. Global Day. In 2021, MSH will be marking it in a big way around domestic abuse.
 - 4. Christmas appeal and Carol Concert.

TRY YOUR HAND AT... making an Epiphany tart

Traditionally served at Epiphany – when the Three Kings journeyed to Jesus – this delicate dessert was the forerunner for the humble jam tart. To make one, line a 23cm dish with 225g shortcrust pastry, trimming off any excess round the edges. Use the surplus to create a six-point star (symbolising the guiding Star of Bethlehem) across the top and fill the gaps in the lattice with spoonfuls of preserve (competitive Victorian housewives used 13 varieties for a spectacular stained-glass finish). Preheat the oven to 200°C and bake for 25-30 minutes. Once cool, serve with cream, custard or both.
